First Cup of Wine: Winter, The World of Assiyah White Wine and Fruits Whose Outsides Cannot Be Eaten

Today it is still winter, and we need the most protection from the outside elements. In the Kabbalist world, we are also the furthest from perfection. With this fruit and cup, we have a rooted awareness of the tangible world around us. We are curled up, hidden behind our skins.

First Fruits: Those with Protective Shells

If you remove one nut from a pile of walnuts, every nut in the pile will be shaken. Similarly, if one person sins, the whole community will suffer (Midrash Song of Songs Rabba 1).

Second Cup of Wine: Spring, the World of Yetzira, Formation

We now turn toward the inner, spiritual development. The fruit for this world has no outer shell but has an inner pit that we don't eat. The pit or seed is a means of growth and renewal. It symbolizes the earth's reawakening after the long winter. It is beginning to warm up, just a hint of what is to come, so we add a drop of warm red wine to our white cup.

Blessed are You, Lord our G-d, Ruler of the Universe, Creator of the fruit of the wine.

No part of the date palm is wasted: The fruit is eaten, the embryonic branches (lulav) are used for the Four Species of Sukkot, the mature fronds can cover a sukkah, the fibers between the branches can make strong ropes, the leaves can be woven into mats and baskets, the trunks can be used for rafters. Similarly, no one is worthless in Israel: some are scholars, some do good deeds, and some work for social justice. (Midrash Numbers Rabba 3.1)

Third Cup of Wine: Summer, the World of Beriah, Creation

In the third world, Creation, the tree has grown into a full being and is blooming. No protective shells are needed inside or out. We add more red wine to our cups. The world is overflowing, bursting with energy.


