With Blessing

A Message from Rabbi Rick Kellner

Memory is a powerful tool that helps us interpret the past and to shape our future. While most think of memory in a linear fashion involving past, present, and future, Jews have always recognized memory as a way to keep alive the lessons and values of the lives we have lost. I was once taught that the word *yizkor*, which is typically translated as remember can often be understood to mean make present. When we remember a loved one who has died, we make them present in our lives. While we can no longer hear the voices of our loved ones or speak to them about the current challenges we are facing, their words and lessons live on through us.

There has long been an understanding that the remember past shapes the present. As stories are told from those moments that happened long ago, we can reflect on the lessons so that our present and future can be different; better than the one that our ancestors lived. Gerald Markle, in his book meditations of a Holocaust Traveler, explains, "We understand that the past not only molds the present, but at the same time, the present sculpts the past." We might be baffled by that statement. How is it possible that the present can sculpt the past. Markle continues, "As we grow older and progress through our life cycle, our view of our own past changes. After Auschwitz, survivors typically describe idyllic childhoods: gone are petty family disputes, troubles at school, and banal existences – swept away by


train, gas, and flame." Our memories tend to hold on to the stories that are important to us. Family conflict goes by the wayside because more traumatic and painful events stand out.

As we think about the memories of the Holocaust now, much fills our minds. Of course, to hear a survivor, a witness, makes us a witness. When we hear their story, the pain and the suffering seep into the emotions of our souls. Despite the stories of dehumanization, we still find it difficult to grasp the magnitude of evil perpetrated against us by the Nazis. There are times now when we turn to the stories we hear from the camps and hold them dear because they teach us how we survived in spite of an all-encompassing evil.

Remembering the Holocaust today seems even more important as the number of survivors dwindle and they are no longer able to share their stories as first hand eyewitnesses to such evil. In the 21st Century, while we are all living with rising antisemitism, we are obligated to reflect on the power of words and how hate can lead to acts of violence and ultimately genocide. The stories we share must also help others understand that Jews were human beings, though perhaps religiously and culturally different, our ancestors lived lives that were not all that different from their European neighbors. To see our Jewish ancestors as unique in their humanity is

a lesson that must be taught today. We remember the past to also show that democracy is a fragile thing that cannot be taken for granted. The Nazi party was elected to power, not a hostile takeover by a military coup. We must also work to preserve the sacredness of our own democracy. I could write on forever regarding the importance of memory and memorialization, but perhaps most importantly, I hope you will come to remember yourself. On Tuesday evening, November 14, we will host We Remember, a play about Abe Price, father of our long-time member Sid Price. With gratitude to the JCC for all their work in coordinating this program, we are honored to serve as hosts for this performance. The play tells the story of Abe Price's life as a Holocaust survivor and his work teaching the next generation the importance of memory. The play has been shown throughout the West Coast of Florida and is now coming here. As we learn Abe's story, we hope and pray that his memory will always be a blessing. We also pray that his legacy will be one that teaches us to see and honor the humanity in every person we encounter. We look forward to seeing you on Tuesday evening November 14.



We held our Brotherhood Annual Chinese Buffet "Paid Up Dinner" on October 18th. 43 individuals enjoyed an excellent meal followed by an engaging presentation describing Beth Tikvah's exciting Holocaust Education Project. Rabbi Kellner, Rita Eppeler and Josh Reinicke discussed the inception and early development of the effort, outreach and engagement issues with central Ohio educators, and the first ever three day Holocaust Education Workshop hosted by Beth Tikvah in June of this year.

Also, at the dinner we announced the recipient of the 2023 Ed Schecter Leadership Award - Jonathan Beck. The award annually recognizes a member of the Brotherhood who has demonstrated leadership and exceptional effort in support of Brotherhood, the Beth Tikvah congregation, and/or the central Ohio community. Steve Dritz, last year's recipient, will present the award to Jonathan during the December 1st Shabbat service.

The Brotherhood sponsored the next quarterly American Red Cross blood drive at Beth Tikvah on Monday, October 23rd. Two congregants pledged to donate a total of \$40 to Israel's Magen David Adom (MDA) for every blood unit collected. The response was dramatic. There were 38 units of blood collected which will provide lifesaving resources here in central Ohio and resulted in \$1,520 in donations to Israel's MDA.
