<sup>3</sup> Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>4</sup> I give thanks to my<sup>[b]</sup> God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, <sup>5</sup> for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— <sup>6</sup> just as the testimony of<sup>[c]</sup> Christ has been strengthened among you— <sup>7</sup> so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>8</sup> He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>9</sup> God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. - 1 Corinthians 1: 3-9

Have you ever noticed how many of Paul's letters begin with a warm greeting. He praises the people of the churches he hasn't been to in months, or in some cases, years. He speaks to them as if they are his siblings in Christ, lifted up on faith. He recognizes their value, and lifts them up as part of the body of Christ, specifically calling them out as valued members of the body of Christ.


How can we as a church greet people this same way when they come to our church? How can we treat them with the same respect and reverence Paul treated these churches he so dearly loved, as we see in his letters, even though his contact with them was quite limited, and in some cases only in writing?

Intentional hospitality is important. By wearing name tags, it removes one more burden to a visitor, it signals to them, "it takes time to learn 100 names, but we welcome you, and here we like to call each other by name as if we are family." I encourage us all to be more intentional about wearing our name tags, and in so doing, being more welcoming to visitors.

Sharing of the Peace is statistically one of the moments visitors to new churches report as the most frightening moment of the service. If you see a visitor to our church, be intentional about welcoming them during this time, but not overwhelming. Inviting them to fellowship time after the service can help. But also allow them to meet and greet as many people as possible, even introducing them to others, is important (don't hog them all to yourself).

And, as mentioned, Fellowship time after the service is a vital part of recognizing a visitor or infrequent attender as a member of the body of Christ. There is a balance in being hospitable and intrusive, but I believe giving a salutation like Paul, being intentionally inviting, and informative is important. Helping people get plugged into the church in more than one way has been proven to increase the likelihood of them becoming part of the church community, invite them to participate in a program or event.

As a new ministry season is upon us, let's be as intentional as we can about welcoming and inviting people into our community. Let's give praise for them, lifting them up as fellow believers. We are all on a journey, let's invite them to join us as we journey together!



## **Church Council Update**



The Church Council approved an operating budget for 2019 with a deficit of \$45,050 subject to a condition that a Task Force be established to balance our budget within two years.

Recommendations from the Task Force were presented to the Council at its June 2019 meeting including its primary one that the church focus on growth going forward. It was noted that the church will have reduced it projected staff cost by \$89,465 by the end of 2019 which will significantly reduce the operating budget deficit for 2020.

The first Task Force recommendation approved by the Council was to authorize the Trustees to proceed with rental of certain church areas subject to suitable alternative space being found for staff and a suitable tenant. Further discussion of this proposal will be held at the Church Council's September meeting.

The second recommendation

approved was the establishment of a Development Team to propose future fundraising projects.

The third approved recommendation from the Task Force was to empower the Welcome All and Communications teams through additional personnel and funding support to improve the reach of BJUMC within our local community. This recommendation may be expanded to include other groups within the church with further recommendations to be presented to the Council at its September meeting.

The Council will continue to assess financial projections made by the Finance Committee and its operating budget to be proposed for 2020.



# **FALL GOLF OUTING NEWS:**

It's 6 weeks until our big golf outing on October 14!! We have had many verbal commitments as well as monetary payments already, thank you all for that, but there is still plenty of work to do to ensure our fund raiser is successful. The attached flyer has much of the general information, but here are some more specifics:

**Golfers needed:** We are committed to the golf course to pay for 18 foursomes. To date, we have about half of that minimum verbally committed. Please ask your friends, family, neighbors, co-workers to join us for the day of golf. Groups of less than 4 are fine, we will combine people to make foursomes. All levels of golf are welcome, the format is a "scramble", which means the group plays the hole off the best shot of the 4 people. *This is our biggest need to ensure a successful fundraiser* 

Raffle Prizes/Goodie Bag items: All golfers will receive a "goodie bag" on the day of the outing. What's in that goodie bag is up to us. Typically, they are company marketing items, ranging from hats, logo golf balls, tees, towels, and other golf items, pens, sample/trial size items, umbrellas, etc., you get the idea. Please check with your employers to see if they can donate any items that we can use as giveaways. We would need around 80 of the items to provide to the estimated amount of golfers.

Raffle prizes would generally be larger in nature than the goodie bag items. This would be things you would see at a tricky tray event, baskets with common items, store/internet gift cards, golf paraphernalia, trips, golf outings, technology items. Larger valued items, such as golf experiences, use of rental properties, etc, can be live or silent auctioned off to generate greater income from the event.

Please consider what you can donate to the goodie bags and raffle prizes

**Hole Sponsors**: This is our easiest fund raising aspect of the golf outing. Your name, family name, company, or whatever else you want to be displayed, will be made into a sign and planted at one of the holes on the golf course for everyone to see.

**Dinner:** For those who do not, or cannot golf on that day, feel free to join us just for the dinner portion of the event. This will also be when we will have the raffle/auction. For the golfers, the cost includes dinner already.


