

Believers Joyously Unified in Mission with Christ

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FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR MATT

"LOVE, unimaginable love!"

ROMANS 5:12-21

When I sit back and ponder the incarnation, the birth of Jesus, I am overwhelmed by a deep sense of love. That the creator of the universe would so humble themselves to take on a human form, and be born in such a lowly estate of a manger is inconceivable to me. Yet, we have countless pieces of information which help paint this event as part of a divine plan, written throughout history, the prophets of old, the appearance of a star and the interpretations of leaders from afar.

It can be hard, at times, to understand the incarnation, that the Lord our God, came to live among us, to teach us, and ultimately to take on our punishment for us. Romans 5 summarizes the theology of the event. I hope, as you recount the birth narratives from the scriptures this season, you take the time out to see the big picture, the divine plan, a plan of reconciliation, a plan of manifest love.

Often, we get so overwhelmed with giftgiving, and commercialism, that we lose sight of the real gift of Christmas. We know, somewhere in our minds, that Christmas is some sort of a gift. But we lose sight of what that gift really is. Although it seems strange, during Christmas, to 12 Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned— 13 sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. 14 Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come.

¹⁵ But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. ¹⁶ And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification. ¹⁷ If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

¹⁸ Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. ¹⁹ For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous. ²⁰ But law came in, with the result that the trespass multiplied; but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, ²¹ so that, just as sin exercised dominion in death, so grace might also exercise dominion through justification ^[f] leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

think of the crucifixion, I encourage you to pause, to recognize that these two events go hand in hand, as part of the divine plan for reconciliation.

In Christmas, we recognize the joy of a messiah. The prophets had told of one who would come, to usher in a new era of holy justice, of righteousness, of peace. They had no idea how this messiah would accomplish these things. Based on the prophets, and world history up to that point, one would naturally assume this messiah would use our human institutions, power, war, and force, to usher in the new era. Instead, we got Jesus, born in a feeding trough, hardly the birth of such a leader. But Jesus accomplished in his life, what no human, even the most devout of humans could, he lived a life of perfection, in complete unity with the divine will.

This Christmas, lets pause, and recognize the fullness of this gift, that God came to us in our lowest, while we were still sinners (and still are), and came to provide access to God-self to all. Jesus opened the doors to the Kingdom of Heaven, that all who believe might come to know him, and live life in the eternal glory of our God almighty. Only through coming as he did, in humble mean estate, did he accomplish the world change so needed. Only through his ultimate act of humility on that cross did he take on the sin of the world, providing a new way forward for us, in the new covenant. Let's recognize the true gift of the incarnation, more than the birth of an infant, but truly, the true presence of the Lord for all eternity, made possible through this life, death, and resurrection. Then, we can fully recognize the true Love of our Lord, the Love that transformed, and continues to transform the world into yet a new creation.




PREPARE FOR CHRISTMAS BY ENGAGING IN ADVENT!

Through the years, Bishop Janes UMC has celebrated the Christmas season in many ways. Most notable is the Christmas tree sales. They have gone on since the mid-20th century; I don't remember a time when we didn't have them. One story that sticks in my mind: a woman rode up on a bicycle, bought a tree, stuck the trunk in her bicycle basket, and rode home, one hand on the handlebars, the other on the tree!

We have often had three different Christmas Eve services, working around the traditional carol singing on the green outside. Church members have also contributed to many causes, including Camp YDP in Paterson.

When I was young, Bishop Janes did a 'live creche' at Christmas, with a couple from the church playing Mary and Joseph, who could provide a newborn infant to portray Jesus. The same couple – I don't remember their name! – managed to provide the newborn for two years in a row! There was some discussion in the congregation if they would make it three in a row, I remember – they didn't, missing by a few months. (That was the Baby Boom era.)

Christmas has often been enlivened by pageants, such as the ones that Kim Dial has arranged for us. Of course, she had help, not only from the many participants,


but from backstage helpers (Carol Lutes comes to mind). Pageants also existed long ago; my sister reminds me that our mother directed one.

Bishop Janes has a long history of special musical events at Christmas, led by numerous music directors. I remember Mabel Davis, in my youth, and John Kaefer, in this century, creating memorable music extravaganzas.

We have also benefited from many hands working to create beautiful decorations for the church, most recently under the direction of the talented Richard Blauvelt. I remember Pastor Dave Dutcher telling story of one time, during a service, when a candle, carelessly handled, set the decorations behind him on fire – but I think that that was at a different church! Each church celebrates Christmas in its own way.


- Advent Study <u>Almost Christmas: A Wesleyan Advent Experience</u>:

 In *Almost Christmas: A Wesleyan Advent Experience*, video segments led by author and pastor Magrey deVega provide a springboard for exploration of Advent. In this fourweek study we are encouraged to follow Christ wholeheartedly during Advent, connecting the Wesleyan heritage with traditional Advent themes of Love, Hope, Joy, and Peace. This DVD features four authors discussing the key ideas in each chapter of the book, including personal stories, conversation and insights on the Advent season. This program begins on the *first Sunday of Advent, November 29th* and *ends on December 20th*.
- There will be no programs on Sunday, December 29th or January 23rd for the Christmas/New Year's weekend.
- Beginning on *Sunday, January 10th* we begin a 5-week study of John *Wesley's 22 Questions* for self-reflection. As part of the United Methodist Church you may have heard someone ask, "How is your soul?" John Wesley actually developed a series of 22 questions that he used with his "Holy Club" at Oxford University as a means of daily personal reflection. In our discussions we will focus on how they apply to modern Christians.
- We'll explore another *Spiritual Discipline on Sunday, February 14th*. The following week begins *Lent which runs from February 21st through March 21st*. The course will be announced at a later date. We hope you'll consider joining some or all of our small group discussions.
