November is a month of thanksgiving. I have much to be thankful for this year. First and foremost, I am thankful for the opportunity to be in ministry at this church. As I reflect upon this church, I am reminded of the Apostle Paul's address to the Colossians, chapter 1:

"In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, <sup>4</sup> for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, <sup>5</sup> because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel <sup>6</sup> that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in

the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God." Colossians 1:3-6.

When I think about our church, and the people we have, I am filled with a sense of great hope for our world. Knowing there are people who are passionately committed to sharing the grace of God in the world gives me great peace. There are many troubles in the world, but as long as there are people using their gifts to share the Gospel, I have hope.

When we use our gifts, we often talk about fruit. Are our ministries bearing fruit in the world? I believe we are. Whenever we step out in faith to share an act of grace with another in the name in the Lord, we are blessed by the Lord. There are many ministries of this church which do so many wonderful things in our community, whether it is supporting one of the food banks, volunteering, collecting coat drives, knitting or stitching, providing support to youth programming in oppressed areas, teaching children, or putting together gatherings and community events which share our love for each other with the community, the gifts and talents of this community of faith are broad.

Paul continues his letter to the Colossians:

"9 For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, <sup>10</sup> so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. <sup>11</sup> May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully <sup>12</sup> giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light."

Indeed, as I look at the ministries and the people of this church, I feel blessed to be here. I, like Paul, continue to pray for these ministries, the energies, the efforts, the thoughts of the people that work tirelessly to carry them out. More than anything, I pray that our ministries are fruitful in sharing the grace of our Lord.

As thanksgiving comes, lets take time out to remember to give thanks. I hope we can all give thanks to the Lord for our blessings, not just the obvious, but also our gifts, our talents, our passions. As we give thanks to God for blessing us in this way, let's ask God to bless us in ministry to this community. Let's ask God to help us bear fruit in every good work, that we may grow in the knowledge of God. I believe, Like Paul, that if we take the time to specifically give thanks for these gifts, and ask for God's blessings as we employ them, we invite the power of the Holy Spirit to work in and through us. This is like putting fertilizer on the crops, and we can bear much good fruit.

# Little Lambs TODDLER CENTER A Ministry of Bishop Janes Church

October was an exciting month with Family Fun Night, Swift Farm Petting Zoo, Back to School Night and Halloween celebrations. In November, we will focus on thankfulness and gratitude for all God gives us. Of course, this includes Thanksgiving! All classes will learn about the first Thanksgiving; including lessons on Pilgrims and Native Americans. The highlight of this study will be a feast with the fours wearing pilgrim hats and the threes their feather headdresses.

Our many enrichment programs are in full swing. In this TB edition, we are featuring two: Wee Little Arts and Little Shepherds.

Wee Little Arts is a nationally acclaimed art education program designed to develop a

full range of introductory training in the visual arts. Offered to our three and four year old classes, students have now completed Session 1, Elements of Art. This session exposed students to the building blocks of art education, art history and art in children's literature. Elements of line, shape, color and texture were introduced. We had fun painting elephants! Two examples are printed here!

Session 2 begins in November and focus' on observing art in the environment and utilizing beginning drawing skills to create works of art. Classes meet once a week for 45 minutes.

Little Shepherds is a year- long program of Bible Stories and music for Little Lambs four year old students. Taught by Pastor Matt and Kim Dial, students gather once a week to pray, sing, hear Bible stories, and play games. At the conclusion of the class, there is fellowship time with the families. The curriculum begins in September with favorite Old Testament stories and continues on through the life of Jesus, ending with Pentecost in May/June. So far, we have learned about The Creation, Noah, Joseph and Moses.







# TOWN HALL MEETING

# **SUNDAY NOVEMBER 24, 2019 @ 11 AM**

We will gather as a church on Sunday November 24, after worship to have an informational session on what is going on in our denomination, our conference, and our church, with respect to "the Way Forward. This discussion will highlight these three main areas as follows:

- 1) Our Conference: Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church
  - a. Legislation passed at Special Session on October 26
  - b. Episcopal Address of Bishop Schol
- 2) Our Church
  - a. Reconciling Ministries
  - b. Covenant Community
- 3) The denomination:
  - a. Structure and Function of the General Conference
  - b. General Conference 2020, A selection of legislation being proposed

This is a LOT of information, and will be more than we can get into in great detail. Our goal is to keep you updated as to what is going on, and the general picture and shape of the changes. With respect to our local Annual Conference, the recent special session took major steps forward to make our churches in this region more inclusive.

For our congregation, this information will be received differently by each of us. We have members that have convictions and beliefs that The Book of Discipline should be followed concerning the paragraphs on homosexuality. We have other members who believe that discriminating against any group of people is not of God and that God's revelation about how we understand human sexuality is unfolding. We also recognize that within our congregation are people, families and supporters of the LGBTQ community. In our congregation all are welcome, and recognized as the beloved creation of God.

I will be in conversation with the church council and Reconciling Ministries Team about the recent Way Forward Report to discern how God is leading us at this time. You may find more information about the annual conference session, read the full report and ask questions on the Way Forward pages of the GNJ website at <a href="www.gnjumc.org">www.gnjumc.org</a> or read the summary on the next page as a primer. We are a congregation with diverse views and understandings. Diversity of understanding and views are healthy. We welcome difference. I ask that you keep the congregation, The United Methodist Church and my leadership as your pastor in your prayers.

As we move forward with this discussion, it is important that we listen to understand, not to respond. When we can get to the point of understanding each other, we can see that we aren't that different after all. It is critically important not to use harmful language or labels to any group within our church. Labels box people in and make them defensive. Assumptions and foregone conclusions prohibit full and fair communication and understanding of each other. I believe we are all the Children of God, each created with love and care, and we all deserve to be loved with Agape Love, the love that respects another person simply because they are a creation of God. This love is the purest form of love. It is more than tolerance, it is more than acceptance, it is a recognition of the other person as the beloved child of God, a sibling of our own in Christ, a family member of this church, and a valued and important part of this worshipping community.

#### ANNUAL CONFERENCE LEGISLATION UPDATE:

On October 26<sup>th</sup>, Our Annual Conference (regional body of the Methodist Church) met to address our way forward. A committee had been assembled from person of varying backgrounds with the task of listening to people from across our region, and proposing legislation on a way forward for our church here in New Jersey. They Proposed the following items of church legislation, which passed with overwhelming support:

- 1. Continue to resource congregational leaders to make disciples and grow vital congregations to transform the world.
- 2. Shepherd all congregations into the future recognizing our diversity of culture, ethnicity and belief.
- 3. Create sacred space for congregations to thrive in their context.
- 4. Seek to eliminate harm to the people in our communities and congregations.
- 5. Care for youth in our congregations and in our communities, who face discrimination, hatred and harm because of their sexuality and gender identity. Death by suicide is significantly higher among LGBTQ youth than among their heterosexual counterparts. The Team calls all congregations to be sensitive and alert to the needs of youth in our congregations and community and to use the resources for LGBTQ youth found at www.gnjumc.org/protecting-children-and-youth/end-harm-to-youth.
- 6. Make available trained facilitators to assist congregations with conversations about ministry with LGBTQ persons and to develop covenants about ministry with the LGBTQ community.
- 7. Honor congregational covenants, particularly the cabinet when making appointments and working with congregations.
- 8. Engage someone to coordinate and resource the covenanting process for congregations.
- 9. Make training and coaching available, particularly in congregations where there are differences concerning human sexuality, so that each person can see that others matter just like they do.
- 10. Provide a web page for congregations to communicate that they are a welcoming congregation who affirms the full inclusion of LGBTQ people so that people from the community, especially LGBTQ people, can locate a congregation to worship with and participate in ministry.

Our Bishop, John Schol, also gave an Episcopal Address to our body, in which he lifted great support for the work of this committee, and stated that he recognized the harm that church trials do to people, directly and indirectly, and the harm they do to our witness as a church. He pledged he would not forward for trial any complaint arising out of any violations in our book of discipline related to the homosexuality of clergy, or inclusive ministry (performing marriages etc.) to the LGBTQ community. It is important to note that the legislation taken, and the stance of our Bishop is contrary to our Book of Discipline, the "law" of the global United Methodist Church. It is possible there will be judicial action taken to remove this legislation and sanction our Bishop. Further, the General Conference (Global Church) will be meeting next spring to discuss the way forward for the denominational way forward. Presently, a lot of legislation is being proposed to allow our denomination on the whole to split to varying degrees. We ask that you continue to keep our church, our annual conference, our bishop, our pastor, and our denomination on the whole in your prayers. May the spirit move in each of us to show us all how to love and support each other in these times. May we work together towards resolving our differences in a way which bears a positive witness to Christ. These issues are not over. Let us continue to work towards creating the church that Jesus would want us to be: a Church that loves the lord our God with all our heart, mind, and soul, and loves our neighbor as ourselves.


