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FROM THE PASTORS DESK

Recently, we kicked off the liturgical season of Lent. What is Lent? To many people it is simply a season where we “give something up” to express our devotion to God. Lent is really so much more than that. In the fourth chapter of Luke, we see Jesus going into the wilderness for 40 days. During this time, he was tempted by the devil, the scripture says. Lent is modeled after this scripture.

Lent is a time for us to look closely at ourselves, our life, our practices, our routines; basically it is a time for us to look at ourselves and identify where our heart is. We are called to spend time each day of Lent in a concentrated time of devotion to God. The practice of either “giving something up” or “taking on something new” is a practice which is designed to help us take this devotional time seriously.

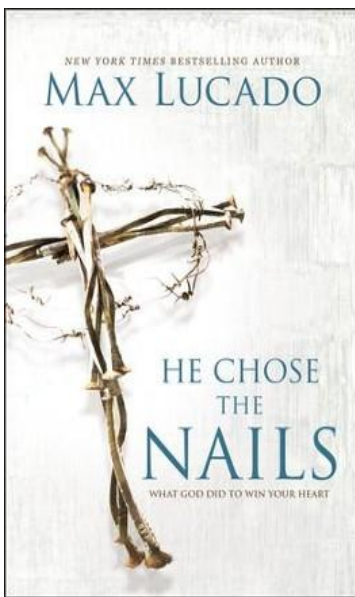
For those who give something up: when you come across a moment you want that thing, be sure that it prompts you to reflect upon God, your relationship with the Lord, the blessings in your life, and the temptations you face daily which hinder these things. This is the way we grow closer to God by removing something from our life.

For those that take on something new: be sure to take seriously the call to grow closer and closer, ever more dependent upon the Lord through this spiritual practice. Whether that’s daily meditation, a morning devotional, listening to music, etc., be sure to be intentional about the introspective nature of Lent, and identify those practices and routines we do which are beneficial to our faith, and those which hinder our relationship with God.

Each of us can grow closer to God in different ways. Lent is not a competition, “who gave up something that was the biggest hardship.” Lent is a very personal spiritual journey, that each of us can take seriously in very different ways.

I pray this lent we can all be intentional, in whatever way best suits us individually, to grow closer to God, and renew our faithfulness to the Lord. May the Lord be with you, and keep you strong from the temptations we face, that we may grow closer, and more dependent upon the true source of life. Amen.

Lenten Bible Study

He Chose the Nails, by Max Lucado

As we wrap up our current small group bible study we will move into the period of Lent. Beginning on March 1st we start a five-session study, “He Chose the Nails,” by Max Lucado. This study examines the gifts that Christ gave us at his crucifixion. These include not only the gift of the cross, but also the gift of the thorns, the nails, and the empty tomb. This program will run through the 5 Sundays’ in March.

After Easter, on April 19th, we will begin our Spring small group study on two books of the Old Testament; Daniel and Esther. These are incredibly interesting books and offer a glimpse of how the Jews struggled to sustain their identity and relationship with God during times of great upheaval—living in exile under the rule of first the Persian Empire, and later the Babylonians. Esther is a true heroine of the Old Testament and Daniel is an example of apocryphal writing in the vein of its more well-know example, Revelation.

Our small group meets on Sunday mornings from 11 am until 12 noon in the Conference Room next to the Church Office. Feel free to attend all or any that you can. We’d love to have you be part of our growing small group ministry. - began Parent- Teacher conferences

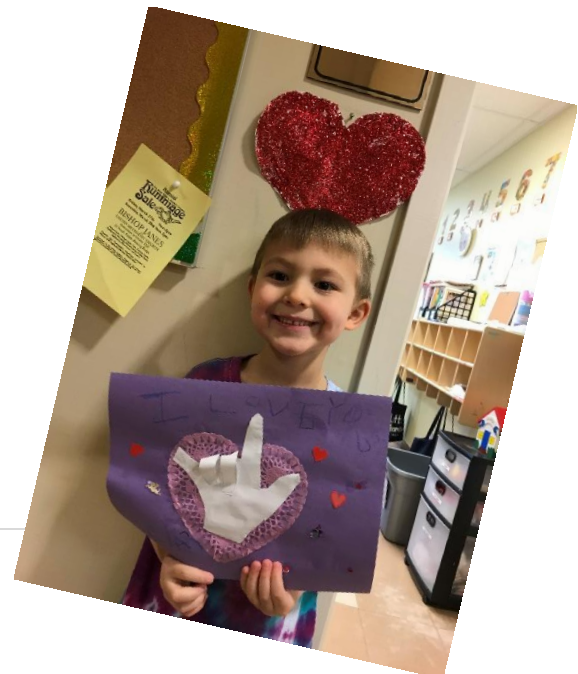
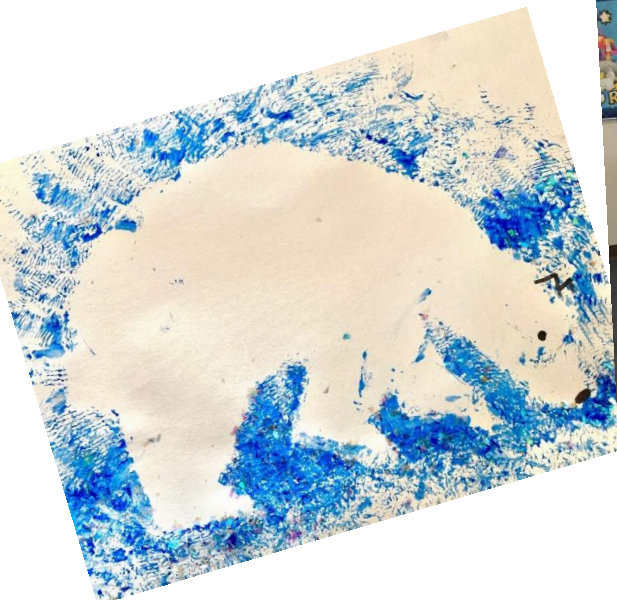
We are excited about the opening of our new Tuesday/Thursday two -year -old class and the five friends who have recently joined us in the class. We have grown!

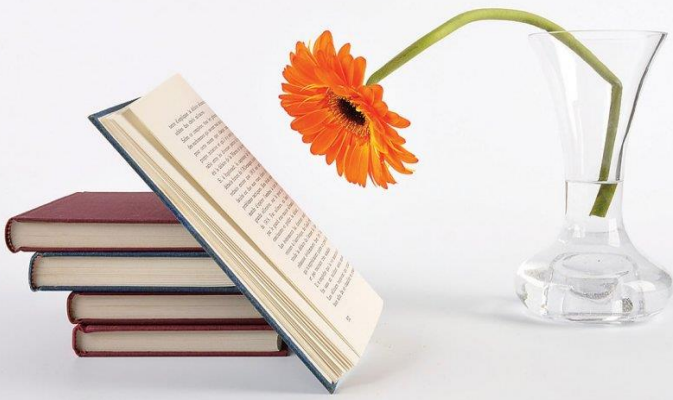
NEW MEMBERS CLASS

March 12, 2020: Talking to Strangers: What We Should Know about the People We Don't Know by Malcolm Gladwell (led by Tami Lane)

Malcolm Gladwell, host of the podcast Revisionist History and author of the #1 New York Times bestseller *Outliers*, offers a powerful examination of our interactions with strangers -- and why they often go wrong.

How did Fidel Castro fool the CIA for a generation? Why did Neville Chamberlain think he could trust Adolf Hitler? Why are campus sexual assaults on the rise? Do television sitcoms teach us something about the way we relate to each other that isn't true?

While tackling these questions, Malcolm Gladwell was not solely writing a book for the page. He was also producing for the ear. In the audiobook version of *Talking to Strangers*, you'll hear the voices of people he interviewed--scientists, criminologists, military psychologists. Court transcripts are brought to life with re-enactments. You actually hear the contentious arrest of Sandra Bland by the side of the road in Texas. As Gladwell revisits the deceptions of Bernie Madoff, the trial of Amanda Knox, and the suicide of Sylvia Plath, you hear directly from many of the players in these real-life tragedies. There's even a theme song - Janelle Monae's "Hell You Talmbout."

Something is very wrong, Gladwell argues, with the tools and strategies we use to make sense of people we don't know. And because we don't know how to talk to strangers, we are inviting conflict and misunderstanding in ways that have a profound effect on our lives.

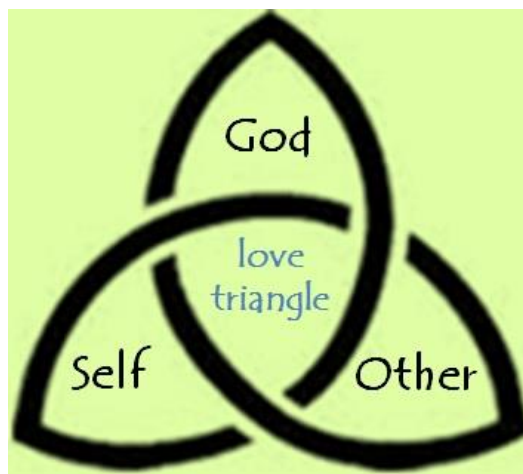

Church Council

Church Council has been busy focusing on goal setting in early 2020 for itself and all of the committees and ministries of the church. Strategy for goals begins with the Vision Statement of BJUMC, “Welcome ALL, Serve the World and Grow Closer to God”. The Council itself has developed goals and committees/ministries are also considering these as a basis for their own objectives for the year. Last year’s Task Force developed “Strategic Initiatives for Growth” which are being considered as well in overall goal setting. FINANCE REPORT:

A full February finance report could not be fully completed by the date of publication of the Tower Bell. However, to keep you informed, here is a partial update. A full report (including expenditures) will be included in one of the Midweek Minutes once Pastor Matt is back from Costa Rica:

In January, we received a total of \$27267.85. This amounts to 8.3% of our Budget. We only spent about 5.8% of our budget. Each month represents 8.5% of the year. In February, our tithes and offerings were as follows:

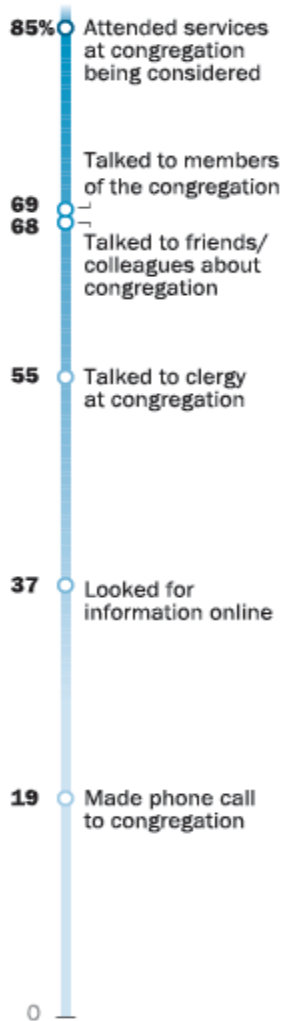

Our 2020 Pledge Drive included commitments to grow in creating Disciples of Christ, committing to enter into enduring relationship with people, to bring them into this community of Christ. Research indicates that people searching for a new church will weigh most heavily their first interaction at that church they go visit. The KEY to the equation, is getting them to come visit the church in the first place. The leading reason people come visit a church is not advertisement, is not web presence, is not anything systematic, but rather, it the leading reason people check out a particular church is because of individual invitation.

The Personalized Individual invitation is not a one-time invitation, but the repeated talking about the church, letting people know what is going on, and generally, just "talking to members of the congregation." This is even more impactful than talking with the pastor.

This year, lets make an extra effort to be invitational. Let's invite people in our community; not just invite them, but talk with them about the church, help them come to know about our community even without bringing them. Sharing

the love of Christ is an individual responsibility that we all share. Whether that takes place in the church, on the front porch in a neighborhood, or on a park bench near a playground, we can share the love of Christ everywhere we go, and be a welcoming voice into our community of believers.
