OT 739G Elijah/Elisha Narratives 4 Saturdays, 1/22, 2/12, 3/5, 3/26; 9:00am - 5:00pm

This course examines the history, content, and narratives in 1-2 Kings. Detailed attention is given to their historical setting (i.e., state-sanctioned Baal worship) and how Jesus Christ is shown in the Gospels as the fulfillment of the dominant motifs of this collection.

Dr. Schwab worked as an engineer before pursuing theological studies and has served as a counselor as well as a scholar. His "real world" experience, approachableness, and creativity shape his teaching. He is the author of several books on Old Testament topics. He serves as a minister in the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. This course is an introduction to pastoral care and counseling with a focus on the problems usually experienced by church leaders in the local congregation (death, aging, grief, sickness, family tensions, etc.). A variety of theories and methods are examined. Goals of the course include personal growth and the development of counseling skills.

CC 625 Crisis, Trauma, and Disaster Counseling

Tuesday Evenings: 6:00pm - 9:00 p.m. (4 in-person classes at Mitchell Road on 1/18, 2/15, 3/15, and 4/19 with all other classes via Zoom), Beginning January 18

An evidence-based course designed to provide students with an understanding of the personal and systemic impact of crises, disasters, and other trauma-causing events on individuals, couples, families, and communities. Diagnosis, treatment, and prevention, as well as spiritual and ethical considerations will be discussed.
