

On February 26, 2018, 70 triploid carp were added to the ponds that have experienced troubled waters in the past. A few benefits of triploid carp are:

- They're sterile and will not reproduce.
- Feed only on plants, not on fish eggs or young fishes.
- Go dormant during the winter and resume intensive feeding when water temperatures reach 68°F.
- They have a lifespan of at least 10 years.
- Are difficult to catch with conventional fishing methods.

The fish were placed in the following ponds. If you catch a triploid carp while fishing in these ponds, please throw it back.

- Entrance ponds (4)
- Town home ponds (4)
- # 2 tee box ponds (6)
- # 2 fairway ponds (13)
- #4 green ponds (6)
- # 5 fairway pond (3)
- # 6 fairway ponds (7)
- # 10 (3)
- # 11 tee box pond (6)
- # 11 green (4)
- # 12 tee box (5)
- # 13 fairway (4)
- #8 green (5) on 9 hole course

Residents can help keep our ponds clean by using a mulch guard when cutting close to the water's edge and minimizing the amount of grass/weeds that go into the water from a weed whacker. Please refrain from planting anything directly in the ponds. This promotes weed and algae growth in the ponds and is more difficult to treat.

A few reminders:

- Each lot owner is responsible for maintaining the lake immediately to the water's edge.
- Only those persons living on that lake have rights to fish in that lake.
- Lakes and ponds that border homes are the responsibility of the HOA.
- Lakes and ponds that border the golf course on all sides are the responsibility of the golf course.
