- Talk with white kids about their privilege and the importance of lending it to amplify marginalized voices
- Examining my own complicity in this system
- Dismantle separate AP/HCC program in SPS and integrate our schools
- Read "White Fragility" and with older kids read "All American Boys"
- Yes! awareness of skin or class or other privilege in the moment
- Yes, integrate schools
- Family conversations to decide how to give our money to organizations working to dismantle racism
- We have students read literature books in 5th grade about American History, specifically the experience of Black Americans throughout history. And then we have big conversations in small groups and as a class.
- From day one, reading diverse children's book authors. Look at your bookshelf at home and ask if diversity lives in your collection.
