A lot of hurdles needed jumped and new technology created to get us to the moon. We have two special programs planned to showcase this milestone in human history.

July 18th - 10 AM - Histories for Kids: Apollo 11: One Giant Leap, a Series of Firsts

Marking the 50th anniversary of the first moon landing on July 20, 1969, hear astronaut Neil Armstrong recount the lead up to the first moon landing as well as the other "series of firsts" associated with that historic mission including the first color transmission from Earth and the first time a customs report was filled out from another planet! Nationally known actor, Terry Lynch specializes in historical portrayal to meet the needs of the young at heart who are never too old to learn something new about history's most interesting, inspirational figures. His one man interactive presentations give audiences a new, first person perspective on the people and events that make up our history and culture. 
July 19th - 2-4 PM - Moon Landing Celebration

“The Road Home” by Richard Paul Evans

I had been eagerly awaiting the conclusion of the Broken Road trilogy by bestselling author Richard Paul Evans, and I was not disappointed.


Chicago celebrity and pitchman Charles James, supposedly killed in a fiery plane crash, due to a remarkable twist of fate, is alive and finishing his walk across America’s Route 66 looking for a second chance at life and love. If you liked reading his other popular thirty-five books, especially THE WALK series, you should try this trilogy. His chapter headings are well done. For example, Chapter Thirty-Eight of Charles James’s Diary states: “We all have a road to walk. The foolish walk blindly. The intelligent navigate it. The good repair it as they go.” Along his way, Charles is learning valuable lessons in how to help new friends and to repair broken relationships with his ex-wife, son, brother, and father. — Ann Zydek




“VOX” by Christina Dalcher

Let me just begin by saying, “Wow”! If you’re in the mood for something that is dystopian science fiction, but could just become science fact, look into “Vox” (Latin for “voice”), by Christina Dalcher. Reminiscent of “The Handmaid’s Tale”, but it is set in America, in a time and political climate close to our own. All females have been limited by the government to a total of 100 spoken words per day, no exceptions. Newborns through adults are fitted with a device that counts the number of words uttered each day, resetting itself at midnight, and emitting a shock to those who go over their allotted count. Cameras are trained on them everywhere, just to see that they are not gesturing in any type of sign language that could be construed as communication, nor are they writing anything down. In fact, the female children in school are now no longer being taught to write or read, but only arithmetic and home economics to be able to run a domestic household. Seventy million women are no longer allowed to work outside of the home. This is known as the PURE MOVEMENT, harking back to puritan times where women were subservient as they were in “old time” religions. The president and his religious advisor, as the heads of this movement

say that this is good for the morals of the country and even that the economic situation is improved although approximately half of the workforce is staying at home and unable to earn any income. They blame the fact that females have marched in protests for women’s rights being the reason that these sanctions have been put in place “for their own good”. (Of course they wouldn’t want that.) This could be considered an inflammatory book as it is can be viewed as a protester’s call to arms and it forces to the forefront how important a voice in government and policy making is for all, especially women. Some of the things that were allowed to happen to these people in the book took my breath away in shock and set my blood boiling. The novel switched from



"The Rise and Fall of the Dinosaurs" by Steve Brusatte



The Rise and Fall of the Dinosaurs, a main selection of the Library of Science Book Club, is a must-read book. Written by Steve Brusatte, a native of the Chicago area working as a paleontologist at the University of Edinburgh, dinosaur lovers will soak up every new discovery Steve shares of important fossils uncovered over the years plus the added bonus of his own personal experiences studying and finding fossils. I enjoyed listening to this popular-science audiobook on my commute to and from the library so much that when I finished, I checked out the physical book (567.9 B912r 2018) so I could see the images he included. I felt I was right there with him as I learned of his life passion to unlock the secrets of dinosaurs that roamed the earth for 200 million years.

My childhood view of dinosaurs totally changed as Steve chronologically unfolded dinosaur history and shared awesome discoveries made in the past decade. Did you know that many dinosaurs including the T-Rex had wispy "fuzz" feathers between their scales and that a few dinosaurs evolved wings to become flyers or gliders? Due to recent fossil findings, it is now widely believed that the impact of the Chicxulub asteroid on the Yucatan peninsula of



Mexico combined with the earth already in volcanic chaos ended the Age of Dinosaurs. Yet, he states that a "few of the most advanced, best-adapted, best-flying" small dinosaurs, which made it through the carnage are with us as the birds of today. Something to think about the next time you see a robin or an eagle. —Ann M. Zydek

"Reviver" by Seth Patrick

If you like novels that are high on the "creep factor", you should go for "Reviver" by Seth Patrick. Part suspenseful police procedural, part science fiction, it is the first installment in a trilogy. The premise is that the reviver can bring homicide victims back from the dead for a very short time period to give "flashback" information on their murderers, and it is actually admissible in court. Jonah Miller, a top investigator in the Forensic Revival Service discovers that sometimes, a sense of darkness can come through to this side of the veil between the living and the dead. This is a book that I can easily imagine as a great movie, and I will be disappointed if it never comes to be. It has been almost 20 years since I have read a truly chilling book that might possibly be nightmare-inducing, even by the end of the first chapter. Very interesting concept, and quite eerie, it is the first in the "Reviver" trilogy, followed by "Lost Souls" and "The Dead Road". For good science fiction, horror or suspense thriller, check this one out. It will hook you in from the beginning.


