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#### **IMMIGRATION MINISTRIES**

#### A NEW BEGINNING FOR AN AFGHAN FAMILY

Imagine leaving everything you know behind – your home, your culture, your language – to start a new life in a completely foreign land. This is the reality for a family of ten from Afghanistan, who are now building a future in the USA with the support of our immigration ministry in collaboration with St. Thomas.

Pictured below are 7 of the children of the Afghani family whom we are helping (along with St. Thomas) in establishing their new lives in the USA through Immigration Ministries. The 6-month-old baby is not in the picture. A recent donation drive held at St. Michael's last month resulted in an outpouring of needed clothing for four of the children who are ages 6 months to 14 years. The clothing was gathered with the donations from St. Thomas for the other four children and separated into plastic storage containers, with one labeled for each child. They were most appreciative -- you can imagine their excitement opening their very own bin! In addition to the clothing, a bicycle, sewing machine, washer, and dryer have been donated to the family. Monetary donations for the ministry have also been received with gratitude.

The six school-aged children were enrolled in the KCMO public schools in late February. No one in the family has any formal education until now -- that includes the mother and father. This will be a huge adjustment for them; especially the older children. The father has recently acquired his drivers' license and is searching for a job. The ministry provides ongoing support for ELL, advocates in a variety of areas, and provides transportation for dental, medical, and other appointments.

Return home and tell how much God has done for you (NIV).


#### Colossians 3:14-15

The Experiencing God group will be discussing key stories in the **Gospel of John** using a video series created by distinguished Jewish and New Testament Studies Scholar Amy-Jill Levine.

Rabbi Levine introduces the world of the Gospel of John by unpacking the stories in their original context, along with examining

how the text is read today. We will explore the prologue, the wedding at Cana, the Samaritan woman at the well and the woman caught in adultery, the healing of the man at the pool and the man born blind, foot washing, Mary Magdalene and Doubting Thomas, and the Lamb of God.

John's Gospel offers readers a new language that enhances how we understand the divine, how we experience the world, and how we participate in the mystery of faith.


Join The Very Rev. Dr. Don H. Compier,
