Dear Friends,

On July 5, 2020, the four United States provinces of the Sisters of Notre Dame united to form a single province. Why and how did this come about? What effects will this change have? We answered these questions in the context of our membership in an international congregation, which calls its members in 17 countries on five continents to be united in One Heart, One Hope, and One Mission.

For the first 50 years of our history in the United States, we were one American province. Dividing into four geographic centers facilitated the growth of membership and ministries as the congregation became deeply involved in each geographic area.

Today advances in technology, communication and travel have opened new methods of sharing our spirituality and mission. Our institutions and ministries in each geographic area will benefit from greater collaboration with both individuals and organizations as we combine our national efforts and resources.

"Becoming one" as SND USA brings renewed enthusiasm and frees us to develop new ways to serve people today. We have relied on God's goodness and provident care, and the support of our co-workers and our many partners in mission to make this expanded mission a reality. We go forward filled with hope, trusting in God who makes all things new!

# 1874



## Our Story Begins



On **July 4, 1874**, eight pioneer Sisters of Notre Dame arrived in the United States. Fleeing anti-Catholic legislation in Prussia, more than 200 sisters had arrived in Ohio and Kentucky by 1880. Invited to serve German immigrants, the sisters soon expanded their ministries to include other ethnic groups in parish elementary and high schools.

By 1924, with more than 650 sisters serving in dozens of locations, the Sisters of Notre Dame divided into three provinces, or administrative units, and sent the first SND missionaries to Los Angeles. The sisters in each geographic area built their own administrative centers and schools and welcomed new members. From each location the sisters extended their education, healthcare and faith formation ministries across the United States and to new international missions.

With the advent of 21st century communication technologies, the sisters began planning for a shared future that would combine their strengths and ministry commitments into a broad national platform for expanded outreach and service.

# Education & Healthcare Ministries




More than 150 Sisters of Notre Dame are still in active education ministries across nine states. Sisters serve in various roles—from administrators, faculty and staff, to tutors and volunteers in early childhood education through college/university, and adult education.

All SND USA-sponsored schools share four guiding principles which characterize the SND educational vision and mission.

- The Centrality of a Good and Provident God
- The Human Dignity of Each Person as an Image of God
- The Notre Dame Educator as Gospel Witness
- An Integrated Education for Transformation

In addition to education, the Sisters of Notre Dame have a history of caring for the sick and elderly. SND-founded healthcare institutions are a vital part of their communities, providing exceptional care to people of all faiths.

# Ministries on the Margins



Ministries on the Margins encompass a host of SND ministries serving those living on the fringes of mainstream society.


A collaborative delivery model takes advantage of strong connections with community partners, volunteers, and governmental agencies in addressing issues around poverty, social injustice, and environmental degradation.

The current challenges being addressed include:

- Human trafficking
- Women and children in crisis
- Homelessness
- Hunger
- Poverty
- Immigration
- Racism

Along with ministry expansions in the United States, SND-founded international missions continue to provide services in India, East Africa, and Papua New Guinea. While much of the work is now carried out by native sisters in each of these countries, frequent opportunities for exchanges between the United States and the mission countries deepen relationships among "Sisters without Borders."

# Vocation & Young Adult Ministry



Expanding their historic commitment to children and adolescents, the Sisters of Notre Dame are reaching out to young adults. Through a variety of panel discussions, retreats, service opportunities, social media platforms, and one-on-one conversations, sisters connect with young adults seeking a deeper spirituality and meaningful life direction.

The SND Vocation & Young Adult team members, representing the four geographic areas, serve as spiritual directors for retreats and ongoing spiritual accompaniment. They also walk with young adults who are discerning a life commitment in a religious vocation.



### **Covington, Kentucky**

#### **St. Charles Community**

An eldercare facility serving senior adults including an adult day care program, 62 cottages and 71 apartments for seniors, a therapy department, personal care suites, home care and private duty nursing.



#### **St. Claire HealthCare**

A rural healthcare system serving more than 5,400 inpatient admissions, 3,800 surgeries, 90,500 family medicine patients, 32,000 emergency room patients and more than 61,000 home care visits each year.



### **Chardon, Ohio**

#### **Notre Dame Village**

A senior living community serving approximately 150 residents including 36 assisted-living memory care beds, 81 one- and two-bedroom apartments, and 20 two-bedroom cottage homes with six more under construction.
