Information for <u>Duke Summer Session for High School Students</u>' 2019 programs is now available! Choose from three transformative programs next summer:


<u>Summer College</u> – A four-week, credit-bearing program for students currently in 10<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade in which they take undergraduate-level courses.

<u>Summer Academy</u> – A three-week program for students currently in  $9^{th}$  –  $12^{th}$  grade in which they take a certificate course.

<u>Accelerated STEM Academy</u> – A one-week, STEM-based program for students currently in  $9^{th}$  –  $12^{th}$  grade that consists of a variety of hands-on labs, tours of Duke's research facilities, faculty lectures, and workshops.



The United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP), established in 1962 by U.S. Senate Resolution, is a unique educational experience for outstanding high school students interested in pursuing careers in public service. The 57th annual program will be held in Washington, D.C., from March 2 – 9, 2019.



Two student leaders from each state, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity will spend a week in Washington experiencing their national government in action. Student delegates will hear major policy addresses by senators, cabinet members, officials from the Departments of State and Defense and directors of other federal agencies, as well as participate in meetings with the president and a justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. All transportation, hotel and meal expenses will be provided by <a href="https://document.com/The Hearst Foundations">The Hearst Foundations</a>. In addition, each delegate will also be awarded a \$10,000 college scholarship for undergraduate studies, with encouragement to pursue coursework in history and political science. **Applications are due on Monday, October 22**. **Applications are open for the ACT Student Champion Award!** The ACT Student Champion Award recognizes one student in each state who is tenacious and persistent, no matter the challenge, and is prepared for life after high school with a goal in mind and plan in place.

ACT Student Champions receive a \$500 non-renewable scholarship, certificate, and state-level recognition. Please encourage students in the graduating class of 2019 who have taken the ACT who fit the following criteria to apply:

- High school seniors who have overcome challenges and can articulate their education and/or career actions.
- At a minimum students must have a composite ACT score of 22 on a single test date OR a Gold ACT® WorkKeys® National Career Readiness Certificate®

## The 2019/2020 FAFSA is available starting October 1, 2018.

Please visit <a href="https://fafsa.ed.gov">https://fafsa.ed.gov</a> to complete this by using <a href="https://fafsa.ed.gov">2017</a> tax and income information. The federal government provides more than \$150 billion in grants, loans, and work study funds to students each year. In order to get that money, you must first complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, commonly called the FAFSA. Completing and submitting the <a href="https://example.gov/FAFSA">FAFSA</a> is free and easier than ever, and it gives you access to the largest source of financial aid to pay for college.
