Federal Updates

Congress is in recess this week.

House Passes Bills on Juvenile Justice and Missing and Exploited Children

Last week the House passed on a bipartisan basis the [Improving Support for Missing and Exploited Children Act](#) (H.R. 1808), which updates the Missing Children's Assistance Act to strengthen national efforts to recover and protect missing and exploited children. President's Budget

Last week the Trump Administration released the President's FY18 Budget Request, called "[A New Foundation for American Greatness](#)." John Sciamanna prepared an incredibly helpful summary of child welfare programs during our meeting, which is summarized in the attached documents.

Health Care

On Wednesday, the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) released a cost estimate for the American Health Care Act (AHCA), which passed the House last month. The analysis showed that the bill would shrink the U.S. budget deficit by \$119 billion - \$32 billion less than the original House bill proposed in March. It also estimates that 23 million people would lose their health-care coverage by 2026 – about one million fewer people than the projection in the original bill. Majority Leader Mitch McConnell appointed a Republican working group to design a health reform bill as a replacement to the House's American Health Care Act (AHCA). The group of senators reportedly has been meeting very frequently, focusing on a wide array of issues including Medicaid, private market reforms, and affordability.

Sign-on Letter from ABA on Proposed Elimination of Legal Services Corporation

In response to the FY18 Trump Budget proposal to eliminate all funding for the Legal Services Corporation, the ABA is circulating an opposition letter for interested parties to sign on to and is asking for support from the children’s advocacy field. The letter explains that Elimination of LSC support will make implementation of federal child welfare laws more difficult in two primary ways: (1) by undermining direct legal services in child welfare cases, and (2) by removing the preventive role that legal aid often plays in ensuring that children do not end up in foster care unnecessarily. May 31st: AAP Event on Using Research to Prevent Bullying: What Works, and What Can Schools Do?

This is the third in a series of talks being presented by the American Psychological Association to mark its 125th anniversary in 2017. Bullying — both face-to-face and online — is a problem for many youths. Dorothy L. Espelage, PhD, has conducted bullying, harassment and violence research for more than 20 years. She will describe the problem, including gender-based bullying, such as sexual harassment and homophobic name calling. What prevention strategies can be used in schools? How can schools address their social climate to reduce the problem? What can bystanders do when they see someone being bullied? The speaker will discuss useful prevention strategies, including social-emotional learning approaches, and will emphasize evidence-based programs, as well as those that show promise and deserve more study. Casey Family Programs and Alliance for Strong Families and Communities Sponsor Report: “Balancing Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) with HOPE”

Casey Family Programs and the Alliance for Strong Families and Communities recently released a [report](#) that presents evidence for HOPE (Health Outcomes of Positive Experiences) based on newly-released, compelling data that reinforce the need to promote positive experiences for children and families to foster healthy childhood development. The report recommends that efforts by pediatricians, early childhood educators, and state and local governments move beyond screening and referral for problems, and enter into partnerships with parents to support them in raising their children.

June 6: APA and CWLA Briefing on Family Homelessness

On June 6 from 12:00 to 1:30pm ET, the American Psychological Association, in partnership with the Child Welfare League of America (CWLA), will host a Congressional briefing entitled “Escaping Homelessness: Helping Families Reach Their Full Potential.” Homelessness is a growing problem directly impacting families. Homeless parents often struggle with depression, PTSD, and substance abuse, which limits their ability to buffer their children from the stress and lasting impact of homelessness. RAND Report: "Improving Children's Lives: Balancing Prevention and Treatment in the Child Welfare System"

Last week the RAND Corporation issued a report describing how federal child welfare policy could be changed to improve outcomes for children and youth and save the federal government money. The report argues for a dual approach focused on both prevention and treatment – specifically, by increasing the quality and quantity of prevention strategies (such as the Nurse Family Partnership and Triple P) and by placing more children with and better supporting kinship caregivers. The office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention in partnership with the National Criminal Justice Training Center will hold a webinar on June 7th from 2pm-3:30 EST. A 2017 survey report from the Coalition to Abolish Slavery & Trafficking (CAST) found that over half of labor and sex trafficking survivors surveyed had accessed health care at least once while being trafficked. Nearly 97% indicated they had never been provided with information or resources about human trafficking while visiting the health care provider. This webinar will present strategies to equip healthcare professionals to identify and appropriately assist trafficked persons with victim-centered, trauma-informed care and services.
