Membership Categories

The creation of trial Associate memberships necessitated the following changes in Section 3.2 of our bylaws which the Board approved:

"..... (1) three groups of members; associate

and 3-month trial associate members, who participate in village activities and full members who participate in village activities and services....."

Changes in Board Membership and Scheduling

This will be the last Board (BOD) meeting for Sarah Spence, Ellin Scholnick & Marie Grunwell, who will leave after serving three 2-yr terms. Their replacements will be decided at the November BOD meeting. Fran Lorenzi and Sheryl Amster have resigned from the BOD.

In order to report the most up-to-date information in the On-Boarding section of the Newsletter and allow time for editing, it was decided, effective December 2022, that Board meetings will be held in person on the 2nd Wednesday of each month at 1:30 pm. The Board is switching to monthly in-person sessions and the Annual Meeting, except in inclement weather or other circumstances.

The November BOD meeting was rescheduled to Wednesday, November 16th, on Zoom at 1:30 pm due to the Founders Luncheon on November 9th. The approved new board nominees will be introduced at the December 14th BOD meeting.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT – Cathy Latham

The three BOD nominees are Dee Sullivan, John Marsch, and Marsha Birnbaum. Sarah Spence asked the board members to consider serving in her capacity as a tri-Director of Public Affairs. We are also in need of candidates for Director of Finance. Any member of TVIH is eligible to serve in these positions.

HIRING COMMITTEE REPORT

After consulting with people who were founders of TVIH, the search committee recommended, and the BOD approved, pursuing hiring an Executive Director. Within the current budget model, a proposed salary of \$60K is workable and consistent with other county agencies. We are looking for applicants who are mission and commitment-oriented. The Executive Director's central purpose will be to lead sponsorship, fundraising, and membership development

activities. These efforts will involve creating programs for both the community and TVIH members. Hopefully, the Executive Director will work to replace the Tri-Directorship. The search committee has developed a method to identify and evaluate candidates and hopes to have a short list by January and a final decision by March.

ON-BOARDING

The Board will replace old advertising materials with new ones carrying the new logo. Especially important is updating the TVIH brochure.

Bingo Report – Sally Parker

We netted over \$6,100. There were 150 people. Many attendees praised the quality of the prizes. The Board decided to have a Bingo fundraising event again in 2023, possibly in early November.

Howard Community College Collaboration – Mark Wong

Mark Wong is in the early stages of discussion with HCC to provide cultural courses primarily available to TVIH members.

Hiring Committee- Jim Bouscaren

The Hiring Committee is close to finalizing the invitation letter to recruit an Executive Director.

Election of New Board Members – Nominating Committee (Sarah Spence and Cathy Latham)

As of November 30, 2022, Sarah Spence, Ellin Scholnick, and Marie Grunwell will have served out their term as TVIH Board Members. They were thanked for their service of six years. They will be replaced by three new members nominated to the Board. By unanimous vote, John Marsch, Dee Sullivan, and Marsha Birnbaum's nominations were approved.

Annual Meeting

This year's annual meeting will be a luncheon in early January. A caterer will be engaged for the main dish, possibly lasagna from Tino's, and the Board will provide side dishes and desserts.

2022 Annual Survey

This year the Board of Directors sent out their second annual survey on Oct. 10-14, 2022, to the TVIH membership. The survey was designed to provide data on (a) who we are, (b) what TVIH programs we attended, (c) how we have evaluated those programs and the TVIH organization, and (d) what plans and modifications TVIH should make for the future. Your input on these topics will provide a foundation for planning our future.

Who we are

The survey was sent to 184 members and volunteers with a response rate of 55%, which equates to 102 respondents. 75% were Associate members, 21% were Full members, and the remaining were non-member volunteers.

70% were in their seventies. 8% were younger. 23% were older. About 2/3 were users of social media, with about half using Facebook. The majority (52%) were also comparatively new to TVIH, having joined 4 or fewer years ago. Our members' demographics allow us to develop strategies for recruiting new members. The respondents strongly endorsed tapping their friendship networks, distributing brochures in places such as libraries and senior centers, and distributing cups, tee shirts, etc., with our logos.

What we attend

The intriguing data document the extent of participation by our membership. 47% have attended at least 10 programs in the last year! Only 8% have yet to attend any. We are a partic-

ipatory group. At least a third of those surveyed have attended morning walks, joined Pods, spent early Wednesdays at Good Morning Howard, or socialized with fellow TVIH members at Lunch Bunch and Happy Hours despite COVID-19 concerns, and health issues and busy schedules that have prevented some people from attending.

Evaluations

The encouraging news is the extent of support for TVIH and its infrastructure. Generally, ratings of dissatisfied or extremely dissatisfied were often below 10%. There was an extensive thoughtful discussion about the role of leadership and the direction in which TVIH should be heading.

Modifications and Directions (Table 20)

The survey ended with a crucial question, "What more can leadership do to make TVIH a more dynamic organization?" 59% of the respondents favored more outreach, especially to community groups and more diverse and younger populations. 52% recommended augmenting our search for more donors and sponsors. This fits our search for an Executive Director whose job responsibilities include fundraising and outreach. There was also a concern with finding and sustaining more volunteers within the membership to lead committees, create programs and join the Board.

Encourage Participation in TVIH Programs

Important points about how to encourage participation are:

Advertise events in newspapers, participate in fundraiser booths, support community activities such as Halloween Trick or Treat with games at Stevens Forest Center, and develop community collection sites for hospitals/needy supported by TVIH.

In addition, TVIH can host coffee and donuts after religious events at the Interfaith Centers or free-standing houses of worship, call members who don't usually participate and share our activities, highlight activities like Inge Hyder's skydiving event, connect with business and HR departments, collaborate with other non-profit senior clients, participate in expo-events, speak at senior community and residences sharing topics like housing, health, retirement transitions, make connections with city and county government, take paid ads in local events like the Columbia Orchestra, Arts Council Annual Fundraiser, high school plays, Beacon and Senior Center Newsletters.

Have TVIH fliers, bumper stickers, cups, pens, pencils, business cards, tee shirts, brochures, and banners available at these events.

Volunteering "for" the Village

You've been asked many times to volunteer within the Village. Those needs still exist! We will always need service volunteers (primarily for transportation), office volunteers, and committee volunteers for membership, fundraising, communication, and outreach. In addition, we want to be more of a presence in the community—to be known as a group that reaches out, not just to our members. This is important as our organization "grows up." We must be contributors to partner with other agencies or non-profits. For this reason, we're looking for folks who want to volunteer at different organizations representing the Village.

This may provide opportunities for those of you for whom the volunteer tasks we offer aren't well-suited to your skills or priorities. Here are the first 2 opportunities:

Winter Growth - weekend socializing, games, music volunteer

Winter Growth, located across from the Florence Bain Center, provides assisted living to seniors. They are a friend of the Village, having given us our office space for 2 years—for \$1.00/ year! They are looking for volunteers to come in on Sat. or Sun. afternoons and chat with residents, play cards or Bingo, play music if that's your talent—whatever you feel comfortable doing. They offer training to familiarize you

with the population. You do not need to make a regular commitment-you can try it out and see how you like it. Please call 410-964-9616 for more information. Please let them know you're from TVIH and let me know you're doing it and how it's working out for you.

A-OK Mentoring & Tutoring – regularly work with their elementary school students, one-to-one or in small groups.

As you can imagine, mentoring or tutoring requires stability and regularity to build trust, but it can be as little as an hour per week. I have spoken with their director before, and you don't need to feel guilty about going on vacation or other absences as long as you are dependably there when you say you will be. TVIH Members Express Their Gratitude to Founders

On November 9th, TVIH hosted a Founders Lunch to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the meeting at Linden Hall, in Dorsey Hall Village Center, which many consider the beginning of The Village In Howard. Mary McGraw and her few recruits invited representatives from The Capitol Hill Village in Washington, DC, to talk to Howard County residents about the concept of Aging-In-Place and how a "village" operates. Mary hoped at least a few people would show up, but sixty people attended that meeting! The informal planning group then got serious about exploring the level of local interest in establishing a Village in Howard County.

Fifty people gathered a few months later at Miller Library. in February 2013, Mary organized a Steering Committee. Over the next two years, the founders contributed innumerable hours (and, in many cases, significant amounts of their own money) to establish The Village in Howard as a nonprofit organization in Maryland.

Many Founders and Board Members reunited at the November 9 Luncheon to recount war stories and renew old friendships. It was also an educational experience for current members who attended but were unfamiliar with TVIH's history. Our principal founder, Mary McGraw, could not attend due to illness. She was sorely missed, but her contributions

were universally acclaimed. The group was able to surprise another founder, Joy Cheung, with recognition from the Board of Directors and TVIH members for her tireless efforts and continuing contributions to the Village in Howard [See 'Ode to Joy' elsewhere in this issue.] It was indeed a joyous event! 

muscles that would
otherwise suffer from
lack of use. The latest
technical equipment is
in place or will be when

funding permits. Mind-Motion Video Games, for example, engage the muscles through repetitive movement; additionally, a Driving Simulator should be coming soon to re-train the ability to drive. A Motion-Motor Treadmill was demonstrated during a presentation (see photo). Efforts are underway by a team of dedicated professionals to meet the medical, physical, and

mental needs of patients that qualify. HCGH is growing in its services, and the leadership regrouping after the pandemic demonstrates impressive teamwork. Engaging the community is a priority. TVIH is represented and recognized as a significant organization to include in invitations for presentations introducing what the hospital provides; I was pleased to be the representative.

Loan Closet of Howard County
