Dear Chairman Wicker and Ranking Member Cantwell,

We write to express support for the nomination of Michael Kratsios to be Associate Director of the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy and Chief Technology Officer of the United States. This position is in directing pro-growth policies that maintain American economic competitiveness in the fields of science and technology.

In order to promote economic growth, as Deputy Chief Technology Officer, Mr. Kratsios has shepherded free-market policies for rural broadband and fifth generation wireless deployment as well as the foundational technologies for artificial intelligence, quantum computing and the internet of things to become a reality in the United States first.

He understands that we will face continuous threats from tax hungry nations who have not created environments for innovation to flourish in the private sector. These attacks are especially obvious through the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and the Digital Services Tax (DST).
