This is strategic in nature, as I am trying to gain an understanding if there is a heavy workload being given to students at the end of a marking period and how the homework load is at the beginning of a new quarter after returning from break.

Your participation in this homework pulse period is important in providing feedback so that we can continue making SCCS a better school.
