
Easter Dedications

Climate Connections

Climate Connections, our diocese's disaster resilience planning program, aims to foster connected communities that are prepared to deal with the immediate aftermath of disasters. St. Mark's Upland has been selected to participate in this year's Climate Connections cohort. Climate Connections has two overarching objectives. The first is to offer a framework for use by individual congregations in developing disaster action plans. The second is to create connections between communities to foster mutual support in the event of a disaster. Both are critical to the goals of building resilience and empowering effective responses. Climate Connections envisions that the work of developing an action plan is done within the parish. Periodically, the cohort will meet to exchange ideas, share lessons learned, and build the relationships that are crucial to mutual support. The cohort's

efforts culminate in mid-October with participation in The Great California Shakeout (https://www.shakeout.org/california/), which is a statewide earthquake preparedness exercise.

Meeting schedule:

March 7 at 7:00 pm for an initial meeting via Zoom. Additional zoom meetings in April, June, and August; September, in person, to prepare for the Great California Shakeout.

<u>Attached</u> you will find a copy of "Climate Connections: A Disaster Resilience Plan for the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles". This document, developed by Dr. Lucy, will guide our work.

Penitential Order, 8 AM

During Lent the 8AM service is ordered differently. Following the acclamation, the service continues with the confession of sin and absolution. It continues with the decalogue (aka 10 commandments), and an appropriate sentence(s) of scripture (see the Summary of the Law, Mt 22:37-40 or Mark 12:29-31; 1 Jn 1:8-9; and Heb 4:14, 16). The Penitential Order (see BCP, pp. 351-353) emphasizes the penitential aspect of the eucharist.

Instructed Center Prayer

During Lent at both services there will be more time for instruction and centering prayer. This will include directions for breathing, focus, and posture.

Hiding of Alleluias, Bells, Brass, and Altar Flowers

During the season of Lent, we prepare for Easter by hiding the "Alleluias." The "Gloria" is replaced with the "Trisagion" or "Kyrie." The large cross above the Altar is covered by a hanging. The decorated cross is replaced by a simple wooden cross. The Sanctus bells are replaced with a seed pod shaker. The candle pillars are covered and small wood candle holders on the Altar are used instead. Altar flowers are replaced with bare branches. All this helps amplify the joy of Easter, when we will return flowers to the altar, ring bells, and joyfully sing out our "Alleluias."

Lay Eucharistic Minister Sign Up

Are you interested in making a difference in your church community? Have you ever considered becoming a Lay Eucharistic Minister (LEM)? If so, now is the perfect time to sign up and get involved in this meaningful ministry.

What is a Lay Eucharistic Minister, you may ask? A Lay Eucharistic Minister is a layperson who is authorized to administer the Eucharist (Holy Communion) in a worship service. They work alongside clergy members to assist in the distribution of the bread and wine during the Holy Communion portion of the service.

You will be required to attend a in-person training session that will equip you with the knowledge and skills needed to fulfill your responsibilities effectively. During the training session, you will learn about the history and significance of the Eucharist, as well as the proper procedures and protocols for its administration. You will also learn about the symbolism behind the bread and wine and how to handle and

distribute them in a respectful and reverent manner.

You will also be required to complete the on-line Safe Church series training run by Praesidium Academy.

This ministry is open to all people beginning from 8th grade. This is a legacy that began with the St. Mark's Episcopal Elementary School. Minors must have approval from their parent/guardian. Because this is a religious rite, it is legal for minors to drink and serve the blood of Christ ie the consecrated wine in the context of a worship service.

Please let us know if you are interested in bringing Holy Eucharist to members who are homebound, in the hospital, or unable to attend worship services due to other circumstances. Additional supervision, training, and screening are required.

Creation Care

Week 3 Challenge: Fast from Meat and Dairy

This week the challenge is one that may be familiar to many of us: to eat lower down the food chain. We will abstain from meat and/or dairy, reducing our carbon footprint by eating more plants.

Globally, livestock production accounts for 15% of all greenhouse gas emissions. Many of us are privileged to have easy access to tasty, nutritious meat alternatives, while others around the globe have far less access to these dietary options.

So if going meat-free is too easy for you, or is already part of your normal habits, consider also fasting from dairy, which is more carbon-intensive than some meats (including fish). If you are vegan, we have included some other options based around the carbon footprint of food production. (Note: if you have health conditions or concerns, please talk with your doctor before changing your diet).

You can also encourage others to embrace a more meat-free lifestyle by hosting a plant-based meal, or sharing recipes and food ideas on social media.

Below, you will find this week's challenges.

Easy – Choose to cut out either meat or dairy this week. If you are vegan, choose to cut out coffee or chocolate as both have high emissions in production.

Medium – Fast from both meat and dairy this week. Make a plan to go meat-free at least once a week from now on. If you are vegan, fast from rice and look for carbs with a lower carbon footprint. Raise awareness by sharing favorite vegan recipes on social media, or making a treat for a friend.

Hard – Fast from meat and dairy until Easter. Host a plant-based meal for friends. If you are vegan, try cutting out all products containing palm oil

Father God, thank you for the wonder of your Creation. You have designed us to be dependent on you and on nature to survive and thrive. Please help us to consider carefully what we eat, and to make sacrifices in our diet to better care for creation. Lord, help us to be thankful for what we have and generous in sharing it, by the power of your Holy Spirit living in us. Amen.





Donations will go directly to the operating fund to pay for our regular costs (including our nice air conditioning) unless you designate otherwise.

How to Give Stocks or Mutual Fund Shares to St. Mark's

We have a brokerage account through Charles Schwab to accept stock and mutual fund gifts to St. Mark's. Donors are not assessed capital gains if the stock is transferred to St. Mark's. You will also need to let us know the amount and type of donation so that we can appropriately track the donation. Our policy is to sell any stock upon receipt.
