The Lessons

Acts 10:34-43; Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24; 1 Corinthians 15:19-26; Luke 24:1-12

Acts of the Apostles

Reader: A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

The Holy Gospel of Our Savior Jesus Christ according to Luke. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

On the first day of the week, at early dawn, the women who had come with Jesus from Galilee came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." Then they remembered his words, and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.

Sermon: At the invitation of the preacher, please be seated.

The Apostles' Creed: Please stand as you are able.

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

God of liberation, bring those in authority to new life in the ways they lead their nations. Show them the path of integrity and truth that their people may live in peace, that all may have plenty. We pray for peace and justice in the Holy Land and Haiti. We praise you, Gracious God. **Alleluia! Alleluia!**

God of eternity, we give thanks for those who have gone before us and have entered into new and everlasting life in your presence. We praise you, Gracious God. **Alleluia! Alleluia!**

Let us offer our own prayers of thanksgiving and intercession.

Doxology & The Great Thanksgiving: Please stand as you are able.


All things come of thee, O God; **And of thine own have we given thee.**

Therefore, we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ,

your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all. Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, Almighty God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in Christ. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through Jesus Christ our Savior. By Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us we are bold to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.



We come to the altar and receive the bread with palms open. We ask the minister if we desire a gluten-free wafer. We receive the wine in a personal chalice. They are placed in the baskets by the pillars as we return to our seats. To receive a blessing, we cross our arms across our chest. It is the historic position of the church that communion is complete with just one of the elements. We let an usher know if we wish communion to be brought to us. The Bread and the Cup are given with these or similar words: The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven. **Amen.** The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation. **Amen.**

Cups on the outer rim of the communion tray have non-alcoholic wine - white grape juice.

Thank You to Our Partners in Ministry:

The Foothill Family Shelter was started by St. Mark's over 30 years ago at what was once the Upland Motel. During the years, the effort grew to include food donations and eventually the

purchase of apartments to house homeless families. Today, the Foothill Family Shelter includes 28 two-bedroom apartments, a community food pantry (also open to those outside of the shelter who are in need), professional counseling, job placement, parenting classes, and most importantly hope. They are led by Interim Executive Director Bonnie Cole, Community Development Coordinator Deanna Alsdorf, a diligent board including Melissa Diaz, great staff, and wonderful volunteers.

Haiti Partnership with St. Andre's led by Canon Serena Beeks and Guen Vinnedge. The Partnership started in 1999 with the gift of the offering from the school's Christmas Eucharist to St. Andre's, a small rural school of around 150-200 students, primarily the children of subsistence farmers. Starting in 2004, many small groups of parishioners, students, parents, teachers, and clergy have been able to travel to Haiti to get to know our partners better. Your prayers and support for St. Andre's are especially appreciated now during what is a very difficult time in Haiti's history. Through your support, our partner school is still open and providing a safe place for children to grow and learn.

T.O.U.C.H. Ministries serves the residentially challenged, over 10,000 monthly. Cheryl Hunley coordinates participation by St. Mark's including year-round contributions of beanies, gloves, socks, t-shirts, ponchos, blankets, gently used tops, pants, jackets, shoes, canned and dry food, oral, feminine, and hygiene supplies, outdoor equipment, backpacks, gift cards, and a hot meal ministry where we meet, serve, and eat together.

Red Cross Blood Drive coordinated by Dale Biggs. Since July 2020 we've hosted 22 blood drives and collected 628 units of blood with 647 donors. We've had 69 Power Red and 98 first-time donors. Our current badge is Premier Blood Partner. Our average units collected is 29 per drive - the Red Cross says 25 units collected per drive is a successful drive. In 2024 we held 5 blood drives, collected 159 units of blood, and had a total of 181 appointments filled. To give blood, you can register at <http://www.redcrossblood.org>.

Easter Season

The Easter season is 50 days. We sing Alleluias, adorn the sanctuary with flowers, skip the confession, hear the story of the early church through the Acts of the Apostles, and use the Baptismal/Apostles Creed to affirm our faith. Easter Day is the first Sunday after the full moon on or after the Spring equinox. The earliest Easter Day can be is March 22; the latest, April 25. Easter culminates with Pentecost, aka the birthday of the church. This year Pentecost is June 8, 2025. Next year, Easter Day is April 5, 2026.
