EDUCATION PROGRAMS SUGGESTED BY OTHER SISTERHOODS/ AFFILIATE MEMBERS

Information about each education program is included as well as one person's contact information. This person was actively involved in planning this program and is willing to help you and answer any questions that you might have as you adapt this program for your sisterhood/affiliate.

A. The name of the program is "Meet The Author"

The program is done under a membership with the National Jewish Book Council. This organization prepares a list of touring authors and new books which have Jewish content and/or are written by Jewish authors. A committee gets together and reviews a selection of books and chooses authors and books that are expected to be of interest to the synagogue and community at large. The membership is underwritten by a grant from a foundation within our synagogue. In person, we charged a minimal fee to cover refreshments.

This is the fifth year of the program and we have had many excellent authors/speakers in the past. Authors do not charge an honorarium, only travel expenses. There are no charges for a Zoom presentation.

The sessions are usually either on a weekday evening, usually Thursday, or on a Sunday morning. Before Covid, we were serving brunch in the morning and dessert in the evening. We moved the programs to Zoom last July. In person, we were doing 3-4 programs a year. Last year we did 6 and this year we plan on 7.

We publicize it in our temple bulletin, local newspaper and other media outlets. We also put flyers in the community libraries, and publicize on social media. (Note: post-covid, we hope to have the ability to do hybrid programs - live and simultaneous livestream or Zoom)

Among the standouts of this elegant exhibit: “Double Portrait With Wine Glass,” a joyous painting of the newlywed Chagall sitting on the shoulders of his bride, Bella, raising his glass as a man — possibly an angel — floats above them. Other paintings show a world gone topsy-turvy, with landscapes turned on their side, blown sideways by new freedoms.

T. The Name of this Program is “An Afternoon at the Parisian Salon of Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas”:

Stein was an astute collector of modern art, a mentor to artists and writers, and a successful author. She held strong, often controversial, political views and lived an openly gay life a century ago. Toklas, Stein's life-partner, was also a woman of many talents.

Four Women's League members researched and presented an in-depth look at Stein's life, her literary works, her political views, and the influence she wielded over the greatest artists and writers of the early 20th century. More than 50 photographs enhanced this remarkable story, which was presented on Zoom.

U. The Name of this Program is “THE “ISRAELI SISTERS” PROJECT.....A HISTORY”:

In May 2020, our Program Committee reached out to the Women's Circle of Bet Israel, suggesting that we might collaborate on future programs and share holiday celebrations and cultural exchanges. The project's goal was to culminate in a joint Yom Ha'Atzmaut celebration for April 2021. Now – a year later - not only have we managed to plan an incredible Israel Independence Day event – but we have forged a true friendship across the seas.

For more than five decades, Women's League for Conservative Judaism Regions around the United States have enjoyed “Special Relationships” with the Masorti congregations in Israel. How fortunate we are that our groups have been paired! At our monthly “Israel Sisters” zoom committee meetings, we have discussed families and backgrounds; learned about each other's interests and activities; delved into current events; and become familiarized with our mutual synagogues and communities.

We have been able to share programs and special events throughout the year. Despite the seven hour time difference, our Israeli

sisters have tuned in to watch Women's League monthly programs, book reviews and Shmooze sessions. In turn, we have joined them for virtual guided tours of Israeli sites as well as special lectures, concerts and holiday commemorations.

This year's cultural exchange culminated in our “B'Yachad- Together” Yom Ha'Atzma'ut zoom celebration. As we marked this annual milestone in our shared history, representatives of both congregations came together for a special tribute to the State of Israel and our people. V. The Name of this Program is “EXODUS 1947: The Ship That Launched a Nation: A 3-part Eyewitness Account by Rabbi Dr. Ervin Birnbaum”. Three weeks prior to the Yom Ha'Atzma'ut event, we presented a zoom series of three evening lectures by Beit Israel's Rabbi Emeritus, who sailed on The Exodus.:

Rabbi Dr. Ervin Birnbaum, Rabbi Emeritus of Bet Israel Masorti Synagogue in Netanya, is one of Israel's most respected spiritual leaders, educators and community activists. Now 91 years “young,” Rabbi Birnbaum shared his personal story as a teenager who led a group of 90 orphans on board the largest refugee ship to land in British Palestine. In remarkable detail, the Rabbi described daily life aboard the ship among 4,500 Holocaust survivors and explained why the Exodus earned the title, “The ship that launched a nation.”

The story of “Exodus 1947” and its passengers focused world attention on the British Mandate. One year later, the State of Israel was created.

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X. This program is called “Jews of Florida: Centuries of Stories”:

The “Jews of Florida: Centuries of Stories” were explored by award-winning historian Marcia Jo Zerivitz at Women's League's May program. The zoom presentation highlighted the State's Jewish history through stories and 100 photographs from Zerivitz's recently published book. This beautifully illustrated 434-page narrative is the first comprehensive overview of the Jews of Florida from colonial times to the present. Zerivitz spoke about pioneers who impacted history beginning 257 years ago as well as contemporary Floridian Jews who contribute much to the quality of life in Florida and beyond.

After serving in leadership positions at major Jewish organizations, Zerivitz observed that the Jewish community in Florida had a major challenge—its continuity. She resolved to focus on collecting and preserving, for future generations, the stories and material evidence of the contributions of Jews to the Sunshine State and beyond. From 1984 to 1992, Marcia Jo traveled 250,000 miles throughout Florida, conducting grassroots research and retrieving the state's hidden, 250+ year Jewish history, resulting in a major archive and the MOSAIC: Jewish Life in Florida exhibit that traveled to 13 cities (1990–94). In 1995, under her direction and planning, this project evolved into the AAM-accredited Jewish Museum of Florida (JMOF) on Miami Beach. As Executive Director, she developed the Collections and presented more than 70 exhibits with 500 educational programs in 16 years.

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Y. The Name of the program is “Too Jewish to be Black ,Too Black to be Jewish”:

The speaker, Riva Campbell, is a Jew of Jamaican descent who spoke virtually for 1 hour to approximately 75 members of Beth Tikvah Women in Toronto Ontario, in Sept.2020. We had a Q and A at the end.
