# We Shall Be Free



I admit that I do not have the classic profile of a Garth Brooks fan. 'Fan', might be an overstatement, as it happens. It's more that I have been known to listen to a particular song of his, 'We Shall Be Free', more than once. In another life, I might have been a country singer.

Here are some of the words that members of my family now recite in their sleep:

'When we're free to love anyone we choose, When this world's big enough for all different views, When we all can worship from our own kind of pew, Then we shall be free.'

The New Yorker describes Brooks' 'big-tent idealism' as 'cheesy and vague', which to a lot of Episcopalian clergy

is probably a compliment. I also like Freddy Mercury and Billy Joel and Thomas Tallis, and most of the time it's better not to justify the enigma of musical taste, or as my brothers might say, the lack of it.

The reason why I like Garth Brooks' 'We Shall Be Free' is because it speaks clearly and simply to the faith I have built my life upon: that God's grace draws us into an uncommon communion. To proclaim, 'we shall be free' is to proclaim Christ,

making new all things, transcending and transgressing previously disordered boundary markers. For we are not intended to be people who mark one another out for difference. We are called to a deeper kind of belonging, constituted in God's grace, that draws the common humanity up to the surface and asks us to be honest with one another and to God about the barriers we place in one another's way.

'We shall be free' is also an American song. Freedom is not the philosophical preserve of Americans alone, of course – just speak to the Thai school children who have inspired a generational shift in that country's struggle for freedom. It is, though, a theme that American discourse loves to return to, yoked as it is with justice, clearly demonstrated in Brooks' song.

How, then, do we understand justice in this nation's struggle for freedom? This month, Natosha Reid Rice and I will be in conversation with parishioner and former Acting U.S. Attorney General, Sally Yates, exploring this very question. Sally is the second in this year's Faith in the City speaker series, which attempts to help the church be people who answer the call to love, serve, and transform the world via the voices of leaders and thinkers from our city and national life. Sally is a remarkable public voice, and a public servant for Georgia and the nation of whom we are unashamedly proud. Yet, I am even more proud of the capacity of this parish to be

> a place of public conversation that sees in others the dignity we proclaim for all people in our baptismal vows. Our country needs articulate and loving Christian witnesses to the freedom God inaugurates in all of us. I would love to hear your insights into how justice and national identity voke with your Christian faith.

> 'We shall be free' – a song I won't stop singing anytime soon.



### **Vestry Notes**

From the meeting on August, 2020

Michael Gragnani joined the meeting Representing the Future of the Block committee. He reported that the parish engagement phase of the effort will be on hold until worship on campus has resumed and sufficient time has passed for parish life on the block to be reestablished. Danny Johnson introduced himself as co-leader of this year's canvass, which will have the theme "Lifting Through Generosity". The HR committee put before the vestry a proposed Sex Offenders Registry Policy for All Saints'. The vestry approved the policy as presented. The church remains in

sound financial position, though pledge payments were down slightly in July. Tenancy was ended this month for the Goodfella's restaurant and adjacent cigar bar. Senior Warden Todd Silliman reported that initial building repairs are planned to address settling issues. Simon Mainwaring updated the vestry on the development of a steering committee for Racial Justice and Healing. Following a closing prayer, the meeting was adjourned.
