It was a bright shade of harvest yellow dulled over the years from the brown stains of nicotine that unforgivingly clung to the walls. Ours was a typical kitchen from the 70's right down to the avocado green appliances.

One winter, Dad replaced our old Formica table with his latest project -- an old library table from his family home that he had painstakingly spent the winter refinishing. Dad spent hours working on it -- soaking its legs in preparation for new wood veneer -- the oval top stripped and stained to a rich oak that mother's cigarette would later engrave.

It was at that table that I sat and dipped pennies into tabasco sauce to revive their shine, where poppy would pour the entire contents of the sugar bowl into his coffee when he thought no one was watching. It was the place where mom would busy herself with the latest crossword, or where my best friend Max and I feasted on endless waffles. It was home -- a sanctuary of tears, and laughter. Life happens at the table, and it seems to me that no matter how many times we sand away the rough spots, an errant ash still awaits to leave an indelible mark behind.

For nearly five years I have called Beth-El home. It has been a place of immeasurable grace for myself and for many who have sought refuge from the challenges of daily life. I have indulged in countless tostadas prepared by our dear Maria. I have cheered for our young children taking the first steps into adulthood, and wept beside those who mourn. It is home for myself and for many



The lives of our farm working families have always been fragile, but today the certainty of where they will work and live seems more precarious than ever. We have watched as many in our community have lost jobs that they have held for 10 or 15 years because they can no longer meet the current regulations for documentation. Other families have been displaced from their homes as larger farms move toward bringing in H2A workers here on a temporary visa.

Last Wednesday members of the mission and faith leaders gathered at the table to discuss the current challenges facing our community. Thoughtfully we listened; prayerfully we heard the incarnate Word of God spoken within the context of today's immigrant families. For those who came hoping to hear an easy solution "to fix" the challenges our community faces, they may have left disappointed. These are layered and complex issues deeply ingrained into each of us like a hot ash on a raw piece of wood, but through opportunities shared at the table perhaps a better way can be found than the divisiveness that mars our country.

On Thursday two area congregations joined members of the mission in leading a lunch at a local farm. Under the shade of Oak trees draped in Spanish Moss, we broke bread with over 70 farmworkers. Our hearts swelled

For most of these years I have made my way to the mission by way of Moccasin Wallow Road. Like many of the minor roadways in Florida, Moccasin Wallow is a tiny stretch of road connecting Route 41 with U.S. Highway 301. Over the years I have watched as more and more of the farms that lined this little roadway have given way to housing developments. Where once stood groves of Oranges and workers picking cabbage, bull dozers and the hum of heavy construction now fill the air. Watching these fields plowed under has made me a little misty and a bit nostalgic. Our community is changing, some would argue for the better, but I don't know – what happens to the farmworker when there are no more crops to pick?

with invitations to return again soon. It was a small offering on our part for their thankless labor.

Sunday members of our community traveled to Tampa to celebrate world communion with the members of Palma Ceia Presbyterian Church. We gathered together as Christians have done for generations before us -- through adversity and prosperity, life happens at the table. We at Beth-El continue to listen and pray on how we may support our community through these challenging days. Our work is still here, but our focus is evolving.

Last summer while visiting the General Assembly in Scotland, the moderator of the assembly, the Rev. Colin Sinclair offered these words: "We long for the world to know the *reality* of Jesus Christ." Yet, we are the one's Christ has called to reflect his holiness.

Is it any wonder that on that last night with his friends, Jesus would gather them at the table to break bread, to laugh and inwardly cry, for the new life he continues to offer us at the table.
