A Season of Peace

In this Season of Peace, we remember...and we grieve our world's inability to learn the things that make for peace. We also continue to work and hope and pray for peace in our world.

God of hope, may we seek justice and peace where it is within our ability, and rely on you when the ability escapes us. May we live your love when hate seems to reign. May we bear witness to the cause of peace.
