Opening Keynote Presentation | 8:00 am - 9:15 am



Janelle Wiebelhaus-Finger, MLS(ASCP) and Facilitator, Purple Daffodil Facilitation

Janelle has worked as a generalist in the medical laboratory since 2009. After graduating
from the accelerated MLT program at Madison Area Technical College, she went on to
earn her credentials as a Medical Technologist. In 2015, while working in a hospital
laboratory, she volunteered to help with a new community health initiative that was being
launched by her employer because it was of personal interest to her. This volunteer role
led to a full-time opportunity in 2017 called Blue Zones Project, a community-wide well
being initiative to make the healthy choice the easy choice, just like it is in the original
Blue Zones. A key part of well-being found in Blue Zones is how a strong sense of

purpose can improve health and longevity. Janelle started facilitating workshops to help people discover and live their purpose and continues to serve others through these workshops.

In this case-based discussion, we will explore the concept of moral distress in clinical laboratory medicine and will assess ethical approaches to mitigate this distress.

training. Using a case-based approach, we will discuss common genotypic-to-phenotypic discrepancies and review processes for investigation and resolution of these discrepancies.

#10 Automated UA Indices and the Microscopic Review: a review of complex urine sediments and why the automated indices matter (U)

Jennifer Becker, MLS(ASCP)^{CM}

Urinalysis is the foundation of laboratory medicine. Using case study reviews, we will tackle the understanding of the automated chemistry portion of the UA and its alignment with the findings of a microscopic review and what it means for decision making for the patient. We have a duty as laboratory scientists to use the results of automated indices as clues to quickly identify anomalies or discrepancies that may warrant further investigation in our labs, and that also goes for the UA. This is a driver for appropriate test utilization downstream for the entire lab team for reflex testing. It all starts with the UA. Lastly, we will take a glimpse into what the future holds for diagnostic capability using urine.

#11 Pre-Analytical Pitfalls in Hemostasis Testing and Strategies for Preventing Them (H)

Dr. LaShanta Brice, DCLS, MLS(ASCP)^{CM}SH(ASCP)^{CM}

The "Total Testing Process" in laboratory testing begins and ends with the patient, encompassing everything from test ordering to result interpretation. Modern coagulation analyzers ensure minimal analytical errors in hemostasis testing, thanks to high reliability and quality control. However, test results can still be inaccurate due to issues beyond the laboratory's control, particularly during the pre-analytical and pre-pre-analytical phases. These issues often arise during sample collection, processing, or from improper test selection and identification. The focus of this presentation is on identifying and addressing these pre-analytical challenges to ensure that the reported results accurately reflect the patient's clinical status, rather than errors in sample handling or test selection.

#22 Surprising Transformations: Hematology Case Studies (H)

Dr. Kathryn Golab, DCLS, MLS(ASCP)^{CM}SH^{CM} and Dr. Maria Hintzke, MD

This session will cover thrilling transformations in hematology, with a focus on hematologic malignancies and coagulopathies. The speakers will cover initial presentation, diagnosis, secondary diagnosis, laboratory testing, and discuss the disease processes and related laboratory testing results.

#23 Procrastination: a bad learned behavior (G)

Procrastination is incredibly common and many people use it as a crutch without realizing. In this presentation, we will look at why and how we procrastinate followed by learning numerous techniques to not procrastinate in the future.

#24 The Normalization of Deviance in the Healthcare Setting (G)

This session will discuss the theoretical basics of the Normalization of Deviance and its application in general healthcare and specifically the Laboratory. As our profession faces increased utilization with decreasing resources (staff and finances), the temptation to "normalize deviance", i.e. lowering quality and taking shortcuts becomes more attractive. We will look at the theory and discuss specific focal points of deviation in the Lab, and what we as leaders MUST do to prevent this slipping.

#25 Carbapenem resistant organisms and the detection of carbapenemase genes using multiplexed PCR (M)

Dr. Tricia Ross, PhD, MLS(ASCP)^{CM}

We will discuss the common carbapenemase genes found in Carbapenem Resistance Organisms (CROs) in Wisconsin. Then, I will compare WSLH's current PCR method for detection of Carbapenemase genes to a new multiplexed PCR method. Finally, I will examine the issues we had with the multiplexed kit, how they were resolved, and what we learned from validating this new assay.
