While attending the Dinner Church training led by Chris Toney a comment was made that Settle may prefer "those people" go elsewhere. I was angered to hear this comment and am saddened that we do not heavily encourage inviting locals to our services.

Sunday School needs to be shored up. Having three adult Sunday School classes is embarrassing....one is open to men only. No emphasis is given to the importance of Sunday School. We should make every child's class so inviting that kids want to invite their friends. Youth should be asking parents to go.
