

Doctor of Ministry in Supervisory Clinical Spiritual Care Education

The Doctor of Ministry degree program at Union Theological Seminary provides advanced education and training in supervisory clinical spiritual care for persons who work within multicultural, interreligious and clinical spaces. The program welcomes students pursuing certification as CPE (clinical pastoral education) Supervisors, as well as supervisors interested in enhancing their training and seeking to be credentialed as ACPE National Faculty. Those interested in an education in spiritual care as they discern a path toward CPE supervision or a similar position may also find this program of value.

The fully accredited degree program aims to:

1. Develop analytical, spiritual care, and practical professional competencies and skills.
2. Develop an appropriate personal and professional ethic in keeping with sound organizational principles, high ethical standards and mature conduct in the professional of spiritual care and supervision.
3. Develop a theologically informed, contextually attuned and integrated understanding of the nature, purposes, theories and practices in the specialized area of Supervisory Clinical Spiritual Care Education.
4. Develop the ability to demonstrate the capacity to function as an independent and competent educator/leader in all of the areas defined by the new ACPE Certification process.

Courses focus on the conceptual knowledge central to CPE supervision

The Doctor of Ministry degree is a 42-credit hybrid degree with three two-week intensive residencies (one a year, held in August) and two online courses offered in each of the fall and spring terms. The course work totals 36 credits, and a thesis or project (6 credits) completes the program. Courses will be taught by Union Theological Seminary faculty, complemented by experienced adjunct professors.

Online Courses

Candidates for the D. Min. program do not need prior experience with online education, nor do they need to possess sophisticated technological skills. Online courses require access to a computer with a camera, internet access, headphones, and a microphone (usually built into computer).

Tuition

Tuition for the Doctor of Ministry is \$705 per credit. Modest scholarship help may be available.
