"For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others" Romans 12:4-5

Lesson: Not to be confused with talents or skills, spiritual gifts are better defined as abilities, passions or powers given by God, through the Holy Spirit, to every believer to help build and support the Church and her mission in the world. The Pauline epistles to the Corinthians, Ephesians and Romans recognize twenty gifts in all that range from administration and apostleship to servanthood and wisdom. The diversity of God's gifts is not to set us apart or create spiritual hierarchies, but rather to strengthen the Body of Christ, while glorifying its one Source, through our multiplicities as God's children.

To Know Them is to Love (and USE) Them

We can't expect to use our spiritual gifts if we don't know what it is God has given us! So, this week spend some family downtime unwrapping each members' gift with this spiritual gift assessment quiz.

GETTING STARTED

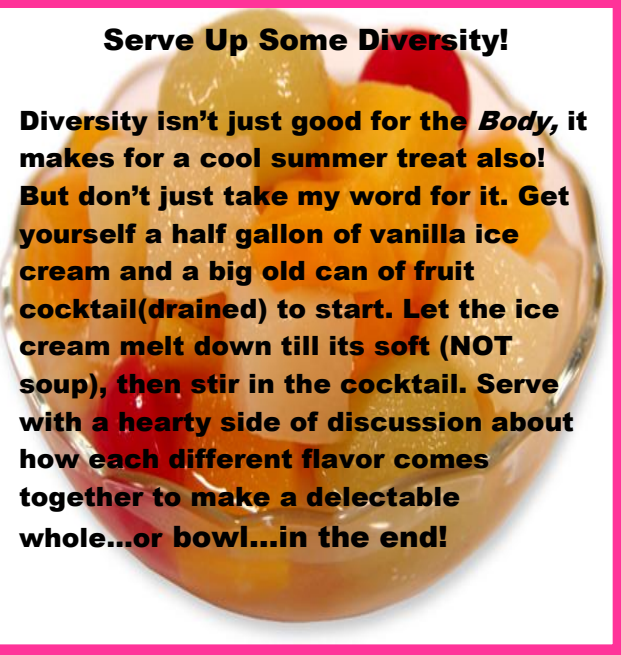
