Nothing quite highlights the world's rivalry, anger, and even hatred like an election season. We see it in the landscape of political signage, the mediascape of megafunded rhetoric algorithmically curated to portray the world in such a way as to evoke emotion from us, and even in our conversations with friends and loved ones. One might feel helpless to make a dent in the narrative of seemingly irreconcilable differences that we are awash in...and honestly, I understand and feel that way sometimes as well.

And yet, we have these inspirational quotes like this one from Henry Nouwen, and MLK's quote about Love being the most powerful, creative, and redemptive force in the universe, and others that remind us of what we ascribe to in our faith. On harder days, I hear quotes like these and think them to be naive. This story of our faith, however, has many chapters that have different contexts and situations but that generally instruct us that we are given the mantle of this unique divine love to carry into a world that is in one way or another deficient in it.
