JANUARY SERMONS

January 3, 10:00 a.m., Facebook: Resolutions: Jean Charles, Worship Committee: With Len Bowman's unexpected passing, Jean Charles will revive Len's 2017 New Year's sermon on "Resolutions." Some of us will recall New Year's mornings as a traditional time for rueful regret felt through headaches, a time for turning away from past messiness, and trying to clean up our act...a time for "New Year's resolutions."

January 10 – 10:00 a.m., Facebook: Foundation for a New Day, Rev. Paula Maiorano: In difficult times our faith has always encouraged us to hold on to hope by imagining the new day that is on its way. In Walden, Henry David Thoreau wrote: "If you have built castles in the air, your work need not be lost; that is where they should be. Now put the foundation under them." The service explores both the castle in the air and the foundation required.

January 17 - 10:00 a.m., Facebook: Imagining a Land Where Black Lives Matter, Rev. Paula Maiorano: Martin Luther King, Jr. preached in the tradition of the prophets of the Jewish and Christian scriptures calling for a reformed or new humanity. This service relies on the prophets of scripture to inform the contemporary prophetic imagination necessary to realize a land where black lives truly matter.

January 24 – 10:00 a.m., Facebook: Finding the Funny in Moments, Rev. Paula Maiorano: National Belly Laugh Day, January 24 annually, is the impetus for a service that celebrates a light-hearted approach to living through the pandemic—finding (or remembering) the funny in moments.

January 31 – 10:00 a.m., Facebook: Love Is the Spirit of this Church and Service Its Law, Don Peterson, UUSD Member: In a reflection originally intended to celebrate the Jean Charles Service Sunday in March 2020, Don Peterson explores the meaning of this powerful opening to our weekly Affirmation. What does it mean when we say service is our law? How can we apply this to our daily lives? What is the connection between service and spirituality? In describing the importance of service in his own spiritual journey, he hopes to reveal the universality of being in service.

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

We begin this year with hope on the horizon; real hope that some of the change that we have craved, for what feels like forever, is coming. For the first time since the drug-hazed 1960's, a syringe graphic is no longer a warning about substance abuse, but a symbol of an ending to a pandemic that has shook us every way but loose.

On January 20, there will be a woman on the podium, who is not there to gaze adoringly at her husband during his swearing-in, but will be there to be sworn in as the first woman Vice-President of the United States. Leadership Development Committee Leadership in Action...Our UU Future is Up to You!

The New Year is finally here! With the busy holidays behind us, Leadership Development (LDC) is turning to the future and the opportunities for UUSD members to fill elected positions on the Board of Trustees and LDC starting July 1, 2021. We call this annual campaign: "*Leadership in Action...Our UU Future is Up to You!*" At the Annual Meeting in June 2021, the congregation will elect three members for the Board of Trustees and two members for the Leadership Development Committee. Those elected will serve two-year terms from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2023.

UUSD elects Board and LDC members by *self-nomination*. The *self-nomination* approach, which the congregation approved several years ago, is transparent and democratic. Any UUSD member interested in serving in an elected leadership position on the Board of Trustees or the Leadership Development Committee can self-nominate.

Leadership Development is responsible for managing the self-nomination process and the election. This work is organized under LDC's *Guided Pathways: From Member to Mentor*, a model we shared in the December *Beacon at the Beach* newsletter.

Here is what you can expect in the months ahead:

- January March: LDC will send a special email to the congregation in late January with additional
 information about the self-nomination process, including the self-nomination form and descriptions of the
 positions on the Board and Leadership Development.
- 2. **February March:** LDC will hold interactive informational sessions on Zoom about serving on the Board of Trustees and Leadership Development. The self-nomination process will close at the end of March. Everyone is welcome to join these sessions and learn more about the process.
- 3. *April May:* LDC will share information provided by the self-nominees to the congregation.
- 4. **June:** The congregation will vote at the Annual Meeting in June for those they want to serve on the Board and in LDC positions for the 2021-2022 terms.

This is an exciting time to consider becoming an elected leader at UUSD. We have many new opportunities and challenges in the coming year...the hope for an end of a raging pandemic that has kept us physically isolated and distanced...and the hope for a new settled minister to join our loving community later this year.

A HUMANIST VIEW HUMANISM BRINGS HOPE IN 2021

Humanism is a hopeful and positive way of living. In the coming months, the UUSD Humanism Study Group will be reading and discussing writings on how we can live a positive life in our time. We will be partnering with Humanists of Southern Delaware, the local chapter of the American Humanist Association, in these meetings (email: hello@HumanistsofSDelaware.org). As in our past meetings, we expect to learn from each other and inspire each other to live a positive and hopeful life.

We will be reading from two sources: "The Promise of Humanism," an article on the website of the American Humanist Association (https://americanhumanist.org/what-is-humanism/the-promise-of-humanism/) written by Fred Edwords and "Staying Sane in a Crazy World," a book by Sherwin T. Wine. Both readings will challenge us to help each other develop a positive outlook and to live in a hopeful way as we face pessimism and disappointment in our world. We certainly have experienced a lot of those reactions in the past year, and we need to prepare for more ups and downs in the new year.

As we approach major changes in our federal government, we can be hopeful because Humanist values and principles are being espoused by our newly elected and appointed officials. They promise to drive our country forward in a positive direction. The new administration is celebrating professionalism, science, diversity, and respect for others. They are committed to reducing the growing disparity in criminal justice and personal wealth as well as opening dialogue between those with major differences. These goals reflect both Unitarian Universalist principles and Humanist values.

Similarly, the medical professions are tirelessly helping us through the worldwide pandemic and giving us hope that science and human collaboration will lead us back to life without lockdown culture. On top of this, many visionaries are predicting that there will be significant benefits that flow from changes in the way we live during the pandemic.

Humanism, with its emphasis on action for the individual and common good, with its quest for finding beauty in the world, and with its efforts to link passion with reason, supports these evolving realities. FINANCE COMMITTEE UPDATE ON UUSD FINANCES

As of the end of November, we continue to maintain a positive financial position with 60% of the pledged income already paid. Our total income and expenses paid through November are as follows:

- Total income through November 30 \$186,328 (67% of the total budget)
- Total expenses paid through November 30 \$96,730 (35% of the total budget)
- The net surplus in the budget after five months \$89,599 (32% of the total budget).

Given the uncertain circumstances we continue to face with virtual services and no clear picture as to when the pandemic will be fully controlled, this is a comforting financial status to be in. We have initiated our mid-year budget update to look at our financial situation in January after six full months in operation, and we will make a recommendation to the Board by the end of January for any adjustments for the remainder of the fiscal year.

One thing remains clear at this point, we will be dependent on pledge income to make our budget by the end of the year, so we ask everyone to please try to keep their pledge commitments, if possible. We are so grateful for the generosity of UUSDers.

We hope this information is helpful to you, and we hope you recognize that we are working to maintain UUSD's financial stability through this exceedingly difficult time. We welcome your questions and comments and thank all our members and friends for their generous and continued financial support during this challenging time.




